## NEW ENGLANDS COME FRIDAY AND SATURDAY

**Technology Out for Second Place  
—Dartmouth Conceded First  
Honors.**

Technology's chances of winning the New Englands do not seem very promising from the present outlook. Dartmouth is generally conceded the first place by the majority of athletic followers. Tech and Maine are expected to be the runner-ups for second place with Tech the favorite. The men have the advantage of working out at the Stadium and many of them have been going over regularly this last week to do their training. Tech is sure of taking several places and expects to show up well in comparison with the other colleges.

The competition in the dash events will be close as O'Hara and Wilkins will be up against such men as Rice, from Maine and other strong ones. Loomis in the 220 is not as fast as some of the other furlong men but should put up a strong fight for one of the places. Bailey of Maine, with a throw of over 161 feet last Saturday, is the sure winner of the hammer. Miller, Tech's best man, is only throwing about 120 to 130 feet while several other men are covering 140.

Fred Cook in the two-mile is expected to take a first in the two-mile but will be hard pushed by Preti of Maine and Saltmarsh of Dartmouth, Cook having done faster time than any of these others. Benson and Brown look to be the two strongest men in the mile representing Tech and should finish close together. Brown has improved considerably the last few weeks and would not surprise track men by beating out Benson or at least giving him a close rub. C. T. Guething and Thompson are the two strongest in the half but cannot be counted on to score against the competition that they are up against.

The team while not confident of taking first away from Dartmouth, is at least looking forward to second place and expect to beat out Maine, who appears to be the strongest of the other colleges entered.

Coach Kanaly will be the principal speaker and will talk about the chances next year and other plans.

All men in the Institute who are at all interested in the Cross Country Team and the Hare and Hounds Club, whether members or not, are urged to be present.

They did not hold their lead very long as the Rindge crew gradually cut down the lead until at the close of the race the Freshmen were two lengths behind. The time for the mile was five minutes and fifty-nine seconds.

Numerous awards of Institute insignia were made as follows: A special award of "T" was made to Wallace S. Thomas for his services as track manager this past season. The M. I. T. A. A. approved the award of "T" for first places in Holy Cross meet. Three men received "T. A. A." in the indoor interclass meet. They were E. W. Curtin, '17; F. P. O'Hara, '17, and W. A. Sullivan, '17.

The Freshmen crew were awarded numerals for winning the class championship. The crew was composed of Captain S. C. Dunning, R. F. Brooks, H. J. MacDonald, K. B. Toye and Coxswain A. T. Canby. Donnelly, Litchfield, Allen, DeMars, Parker, Harrington and Manager DuPont received numerals for work on the Freshmen cross-country team. The increasing multiplicity of the demands on the student's pocket-

book made by the various activities suggests that it might be well, more as a precautionary measure than to remedy any existing abuses, to systematize all solicitation made in connection with Institute affairs. Some centralized authority such as a subcommittee of the Finance Committee might be given the regulation of all these matters, with the power to issue written permits to the approved activities, which must be shown in making all solicitations. To the undergraduates, and in particular the freshmen, this would give a reliable assurance that their money was going to responsible and legitimate organizations.

This system would co-ordinate all activities on a business-like basis, and prevent their interfering with each other. An unfortunate example of the lack of this co-ordination is afforded by the recent tag day which many felt should have been held for the benefit of athletics in general and our major sport, track, in particular. The subject is at least worth consideration during the coming year.

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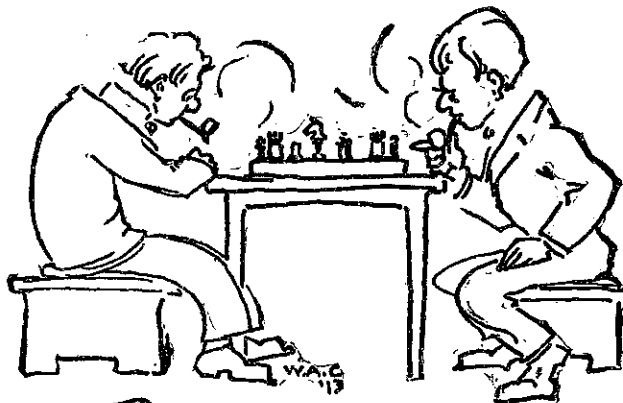
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**FIELD DAY MANAGERS**

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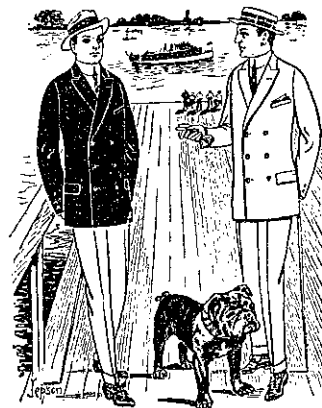
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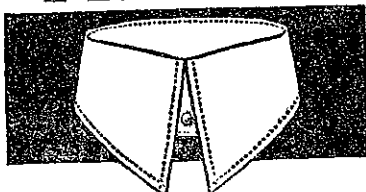
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**SOUTHERN CLUB**

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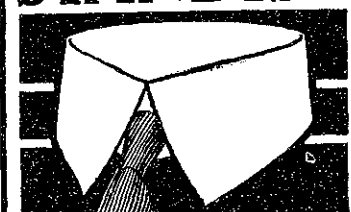
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
