## COMPETITION IN SHOW PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

### Freshmen To Be Given Chance To Enter Tech Show Management.

Candidates for the position of Freshman Assistant in the Publicity Department of the Tech Show will meet Publicity Manager Lucas in the Tech Show office Friday, October 16. The competition is open to all members of the Class of 1918.

The successful man will act as assistant during this year, and will then enter the State Department. Under ordinary circumstances he will become Publicity Manager when he is a Junior.

All advertising of the Show is done by the Manager and the Assistant. This includes the selection and distribution of the poster, as well as newspaper and billboard publicity. This, of course, means work; but it does not necessarily mean that studies must be slighted. Further details will be given in next Tuesday's TECH.

## TUG-OF-WAR TEAMS

### Both Squads Start In Strong By Practicing Every Day.

Both the 1917 and 1918 tug-of-war teams started work last Wednesday. The Freshmen practiced at the Gym, while the Sophomores had the Oval at their disposal. To avoid conflicts the teams will alternate between the Gym and the Oval as the places for practice. Both squads will practice every day except Saturdays.

The Freshmen have the edge on their opponents in number of men out. So far, the 1918 squad comprises 32 men while 1917 has 27. The prospects of both are fairly bright, especially the Sophomores as they have ten new men in line besides the ones on last year's team.

Eight of last year's Chinese students have not returned but there are fourteen new men, and thus the present total is nearly fifty.

## WRESTLING TEAM STARTS PRACTICE

### Eight Of Last Year's Varsity Men Have Reported For Work.

The prospects of turning out another Championship Wrestling Team this year seem particularly good. There are more men out now than have ever reported before at this time of the year. All the Varsity men of last year who are at Technology now have been working out at the gymnasium for over a week. The Freshmen are also taking an active interest in the sport and many have already reported on the mat. As stated before in the columns of THE TECH, those Freshmen who intend to substitute wrestling for the regular gym work must make their intentions plain before Field Day. On account of the large number of men who prefer to take wrestling rather than gym, a cut must necessarily be made after Field Day. To remain on the squad a man must keep his place by competition.

Until Field Day practice will be held every afternoon from 4 to 6. Freshmen who report should give their names to Manager Morse or any member of the team. After Field Day practice will be held for the Freshmen on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 4 to 6. The Varsity men will also have practice on Tuesday and Thursday from 4 to 5.

## JUNIOR NOMINATIONS

Nominations for the Junior Class will be opened tomorrow, October tenth. All nominations must be handed in by five o'clock on the following Saturday, October seventeenth. According to the new Undergraduate Constitution all nominations must be signed by at least ten members of the class. It is imperative that class dues, \$1.50, be paid as soon as possible, and it should be remembered that no man will be allowed to run for office or to vote unless his dues are fully paid up. Nominations should be handed in to a member of the election committee consisting of D. B. Webster, chairman, E. V. C. Lucas, Jr., and H. P. Clausen, or left at the cage for the committee.

The current issue of the Technology Monthly brings forward the suggestion that the new Tech Field be named after Major Frank H. Briggs. The interest shown by the freshmen in their football and relay teams renders their neglect of tug-of-war particularly conspicuous. Can it be that 1918 depends more on the individual prowess required by the two former, than on the solid support by the rank and file of the class, which brings success in the latter? If so, it shows a decline in the tradition which says that Technology wins, not by the brilliance of individual stars, but by the best, most conscientious efforts of every man.

Many complaints are being heard concerning the lack of adequate service in the Union dining-room, particularly at noon. We trust the management will correct this deficiency before the falling-off in attendance becomes noticeable.

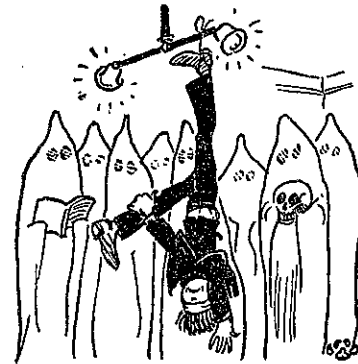

Copy of this motion to be sent to officers of the classes with request that they notify their managers and others concerned."

Last night in the Union was held the annual dinner of the Technology Christian Association Freshman advisors. After the dinner the assembly adjourned to one of the smaller rooms in the Union where the meeting was called to order by the secretary, Mr. Cushman.

The first speaker was Mr. Paul Micou, international Y. M. C.
