BROWN TRACK MEET ON TECH FIELD TOMORROW

Meet Scheduled For Providence
Last Saturday Shifted Here—
Hard Tussle Expected—Major
Briggs Will Referee

N. E. I. C. A. A. MEET NEXT WEEK

A dual meet with the track team of Brown University is scheduled for Tech Field tomorrow afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. This meet was to have been held at Providence last Saturday, but the storm prevented it. Major Briggs, the Institute's athletic advisor, will officiate as referee.

It is believed that Brown will present a strong contingent. In the person of White, Brown has the winner of the second place in the 50-yard dash at the B. A. A. meet. Pollard, the Providence hurdler, is practically sure of a place in high and low hurdles, while Nichols is equally sure of honors in the discus throw. Howell should put up a hard fight for honors in the high jump, and Isaac, the man who ran the fastest 390 yards at the B. A. A. meet, will be a spirited contender in the quarter mile run.

The Technology team will have the advantage of being on its own field. The most likely entries in the 100-yard dash are two freshmen, Bossert and

SIGNUP CAMPAIGN FOR SENIOR WEEK CLOSES TOMORROW NOON

Money Will Be Refunded to Men Called
Before May 25

At the regular meeting of the Class Day Committee held last Wednesday, it was voted that any member of the class who paid his class day assessment and was called out for service before the 25th of May, would have such assessment returned to him complete. If he left after the 25th, as much as possible would be returned. With this provision the members of the committee returned to the work of the signup campaign with renewed vigor. It is believed that the last reason for any Senior withholding the payment of his assessment has now been removed and the members of the committee will be able to at least collect 150 signups.

In this signup campaign every member of the class will be approached by tomorrow noon. If he is not, he may meet a representative of the committee in the Caf today and tomorrow from 12.00 to 2.00 o'clock. The campaign will close tomorrow. At the present time the signups are coming in rather slowly, although there are at least 100 men who have promised to pay by tomorrow. The committee hopes to increase this number by half. Every Senior, the committee feels, owes it to his class to support it in this crisis, so that the graduation festivities may be held as usual. Many of the men going to Plattsburg, or called into service, have willingly donated their assessment for the welfare of the class, though such was not requested. The men simply thought that it was their duty.

Preparedness Committee Plans Summer Course in Intensive Training—Faculty Offers Instruction

To enable students of the Junior class to anticipate some of the work of next year a number of professors are volunteering to give courses at the Institute during the summer. The regular summer courses already advertised will be given under the usual conditions as to fees, etc., but the extra courses here referred to will be FREE to properly qualified students. The work done in these courses will be recognized by the Faculty as equivalent to similar work done during the regular academic year. It is not yet practicable to make more definite announcement regarding these courses, but it is expected that they will be such that students who complete them satisfactorily will be able to satisfy the conditions of graduation considerably earlier than usual or be free to devote a large amount of time to intensive military training at the Institute. Plans regarding this training have been under consideration by the War Department for some time and they will be made public as soon as they are formally adopted by the Secretary of War.

If a sufficient number of the Sophomores, or others, signify their intention of availing themselves of the opportunity, arrangements will be made for a special course at the summer camp in Maine. This camp will be opened earlier than usual. It will be conducted under military discipline and a large amount of work of a military character will be incorporated in the course. Much of the work thus done will enable the students to anticipate what would normally come later in their course. For other information regarding this camp, application should be made to Professor Spofford.

CATHOLIC CLUB DINES

True Patriotism Keynote of
Speeches at Banquet

True patriotism was the keynote of the talks given by the speakers at the annual Catholic Club banquet held last Wednesday evening at the Riverbank Court. The meeting, which was attended by sixty members of the club, was presided over by President de Zubiria S. until the results of the elections were announced when the chair was turned over to the incoming President, Bernard O'Daly.

The first speaker was Father Driscoll, who complimented the men upon their appearance on Palm Sunday and also spoke of the need of an apostolate laity. Following Father Driscoll, Mr. O'Neill gave a spring address upon the gift of faith.

Father Scanlan, the former spiritual director, who was the next speaker, expressed his regret at not being present at the last banquet. He then reviewed the progress of the club since its founding ten years ago, when it had a membership of only twelve men, up to the present time with its membership of one hundred and fifty. He reminded the members of the dominant note of the dedication exercises when the greatest minds of the nation showed that the highest purpose of education was to use our materials more perfectly for the benefit of history. "Every branch of science taught at the Institute is nurtured by the Church, and every science is now a friend of the Church. The awful turmoil the world is now going through can be directly

ENGINEER CORPS TO ENCAP ON THE CONCORD RIVER TODAY

Will Remain in Camp Over Saturday
and Sunday

The Engineer Corps will go to camp today on the Concord River near Billerica in order to give the men more training in actual field work. The company will fall in at 1.30 o'clock in the basement of Building 1 and will entrain for the camp at 2.00 o'clock. A special car has been secured to take the detail to and from the camp. The men are to provide blankets, ponchos, sweaters and mess utensils, consisting of a tin cup of about a pint capacity, a tin plate about an inch deep, a knife, a fork and a spoon. All of the above articles must be rolled up in the blanket, tagged "Engineer Camp" and left in the shipping room before 1.00 o'clock today. All men going to the camp must leave their names and deposit \$1.50 for food with First Sergeant F. A. Washburn. The names of those going will be turned over to the Registrar and they will be excused from classes for today and tomorrow.

OUT TOMORROW

Launch Plan of Electing Officers at End of Year Preceding Term at Polls Today—Many Nominated This Year

PAYMENT OF CLASS DUES NOT REQUIRED

THE new system of electing class officers at the close of the year preceding their term of office rather than at the beginning of the same year, will go into effect today when the three lower classes will ballot for next year's officers. Polls will be open from 8.45 o'clock this morning until 5.15 o'clock in the afternoon. The ballot boxes will be located in the Refrigeration Laboratory, Room 3-115, now used as a recreation room, and also in Rogers Building.

By the plan recently adopted by the Institute Committee, any student may cast a vote for the officers of his class regardless of whether or not he has paid his dues. Each man will vote with the class in which he has the most subjects.

Plan New Body to Superintend
Activities Publicity

The regular meeting of the Institute Committee was called to order today by the chairman, J. M. DeBell, when an informal report was submitted for the Ways and Means Committee by Chairman E. P. Brooks '17 regarding the action now being taken on the question of regular dues to be paid by the members of the undergraduate body, planned to be installed at the beginning of the ensuing academic year. The committee reported that favorable action is now being taken by the Executive Committee towards the installment of the plan.

The Dormitory Committee submitted its constitution and by-laws which were duly passed upon and accepted. A. R. Brooks '17, chairman of the present committee, explained certain parts of the document and also corrected the impression that the Committee was composed of only three men. Brooks

A TASK FOR THE VOTERS

THE undergraduates, and especially those who will be Seniors next year, have a problem of the utmost gravity to solve today. Upon the choice of next season's class officers will depend a large share of the success or failure of Technology's student life. The Institute is at a critical point in its undergraduate development: a point where the student activities must be depended upon for the constructive influences which are to hold its student life together in spite of the demoralizing force of the war. The activities, expanding to meet their new responsibilities, feel the need for cooperation among themselves and for wider participation by the student body. If the Institute is soon to see the interest in campus life which is doubly essential as a stabilizing force to meet present conditions, her student officers, particularly the one who as Senior President will act as executive head of the Institute Committee, must be chosen by the unbiased vote of everyone who believes himself in any way a representative Technology man.

Downey, who are each credited with having covered the distance in 10 4-5 seconds this spring. In the 220-yard dash Technology will be represented by Anable '20, Bossert '20 and O'Hara '17. Doon '17 and Ormon '20 are expected to place in the 440-yard dash, while McCarten '19 and Westland '19 will take care of the 880-yard run. Herzog '19 is running exceptionally well in the mile, as are Halfacre '18 and McMahon '20 in the two-mile. Coach Kanaly considers that the latter has made the greatest improvement in the past year of any freshman who has ever entered the Institute. Mills '20 has been running the best race in the high hurdles, with Anable '20 a close second. Seranton '19 is the fastest in the low hurdles. Ash '20 and Sullivan '17 are about evenly matched in the high jump, and Avery '18 is strong in the broad jump. Wright '20 is expected to make the best performance in the pole vault that any Technology man has made for years. Although Nichols of Brown is believed to be sure of winning the discus, Kellar '20 has improved greatly, and with the breaks in his favor he may capture the honors.

The N. E. I. C. A. A. meet, which was to be held on the two days of May 18 and 19, will be crowded into one day, and will be held on Tech Field a week from tomorrow. Provided that the necessary money can be raised, the freshman track team will go to Exeter the same afternoon for a dual meet with Phillips Exeter Academy.

then explained the method of election of the members who form the student governing body represent the Dormitories. The report of the Junior Mass Meeting was also accepted as read by R. N. Gay '17, chairman of the committee.

The committee would also be required to keep a written record of all the activities and their various affairs. The motion was passed and the committee is to be appointed.

Finance Committees Plans Laid for Next Year

The Finance Committee held its last meeting of the year last night after having dinner in the Caf. During the evening a number of speakers were heard. P. C. Leonard '17, speaking of the work which fell to the Finance Committee, said that its office was not only to expend the money of the Undergraduate Association but to see that it was spent wisely; he called attention to the fact that this is the first year that the Finance Committee has attempted to regulate the prices of such affairs as the Junior Prom. J. M. DeBell '17 spoke on the widening field of activities of the committee and of the need of its having entire supervision of the activities of the Institute and of installing a uniform system of accounting for all of the activities so as to make it possible for each treasurer to understand the books of his predecessor. Continuing the discussion, J. E. Wallis and E. W. Rounds explained the use of the standard form of receipt book which has been adopted.

It was stated during the meeting that there would probably be a surplus in the hands of the Junior Prom Committee even after the deficit of the freshman dance had been made up. This last step had been decided upon as the freshmen gave the dance as a favor to the Juniors and it was thought that the latter class was in a measure responsible for the deficit.

Mr. S. G. H. Fitch, of the Alumni Advisory Council, called attention to the need of a periodic auditing of the books and Professor Shugrue volunteered to undertake this work. E. G. Senter, chairman of the Finance Committee, outlined the work for next year and referred to a plan to have all athletic supplies purchased through a central organization so as to profit by wholesale rates.

Because of the resignation of the present chairman, who is leaving the Institute to go to Plattsburg, R. A. Wilkins '18 was elected temporary chairman and J. A. Clark '18 temporary treasurer. A rising vote of thanks was extended to the resigning chairman as a token of the committee's appreciation of his work.
