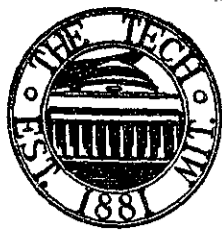

LES BROWN WILL BE PROM BAND

Oscar Hedlund Predicts Victory For Sophomores By Wide Margin Of 16-3

Freshmen Will Lose All But Glove Fight In Friday's Contest

"The forty-second annual Field Day contests will be won by the Sophomores in a walk-away", according to Oscar Hedlund who announced his traditional prediction last night.

Oscar stated that the Soph's will take Field Day by the score of 16-3, missing only the tug-of-war. The glove fight which usually goes to the team with most men will be taken by the Class of 1945 because of their previous experience and organization in the fight.

Students other than Juniors may purchase their tickets beginning next week. As only a limited number of tickets are to be sold, the committee hopes that all Juniors will take advantage of this week's restricted sale.

Agenda Requiring Frosh Scrap Drive As Field Day Errand

Professor Dawes Gives Report Of School Drive As Scrap Removal Begins

"All Dorm freshmen must report to the Dorm quadrangle by 8:00 P.M., Thursday, with a minimum of fifteen pounds of scrap." These were the orders issued by Lester A. Ackerman, president of the Agenda, as part of the freshman Field Day errand.

"We're taking advantage of our superiority over the freshman," said Ackerman, "to help out the national war effort." The Agenda expects to collect one and one half tons from the Dorms and will donate it to Professor Lyman M. Dawes, director of the Institute scrap drive.

Scrap Removal Begun

Professor Dawes stated in his office yesterday, "We have signed a contract with a salvage company and they began removing the piles of scrap today. All scrap will be removed from the yard before the company begins on the larger pieces inside the Institute. Our large tonnage, which may reach three figures, is due to the excellent cooperation of the students and staff of Technology as well as all fraternities involved.

Reserve Officers To Address Frosh

Meetings To Be Held Today and Thursday

On Tuesday and Thursday of this week, freshman R.O.T.C. trainees will be addressed by officers of the Army, Navy, Marines, and Air Forces. The new men will be told the features of the reserve programs connected with the various branches of the service.

The army will be represented by Colonel Edward W. Putney, who will speak for the Army Enlisted Reserve Programs and the Air Force Enlisted Reserve Programs. Captain Joyce of the Navy will speak on Reserve Programs V-1, V-5, and V-7. The Marine Corps Reserve will be discussed by Captain Bradford Perin. Professor J. D. Mitsch, Senior Naval Officer at Technology will give a general talk on all the Reserve Programs.

Sections 1-4 and 17-25 inclusive will hear the speakers from 4:00 to 5:00 P.M., today and Sections 5-16 will assemble at the same hour on Thursday. The meetings will be held in Huntington Hall, 10-250.

The assemblies are compulsory, and absence from all classes, sports, and the elective hour of drill is excused.
