S. C. Johnson & Co. Establishes Tech Chem. Fellowship

A graduate fellowship for work in the chemistry and chemical engineering of wax has been established at the Institute by S. C. Johnson and Son of Racine, Wisconsin, makers of Johnson Wax, it was announced last week by Dr. J. V. Steinle, Research and Development Director of the company.

The grant is for \$5,000 to finance study under the direction of Professor Ernst A. Hauser of the Chemical Engineering Department.

2483 Students Registered For Winter Term

Enrollment Up 26.2% Over Summer Term; Few V-12'ers Left

According to official registration figures for this term, just released from the Registrar's office, there are 2,483 students enrolled in the Institute at present. This is an increase of 26.2% over last term's enrollment and represents a continuing trend toward a high post-war student body. 1,799 of these men are undergraduate students, of these 1,563 are civilian and 236 are in the Navy. There are 684 graduate students.

The largest class in the Institute is, as expected, the freshmen group, 2-48, with 528 registrants. The entering freshmen class has 216 students which brings the total enrollment for freshmen class up 744. There are 295 Sophomores, of which 224 are in the Class of 10-47 and the remaining 71 in the class of 6-47. Neither of these classes has any V-12'ers but both have a large number of veterans.

The Junior class has 310 students remaining, of which 20 are Navy men. All but 100 of these men are in the class of 2-47. The Senior Class is the second largest class at Tech with 234 civilians and 216 Navy men for a total of 450 registrants. 387 of these men are in the present graduating class, 2-46. After this class graduates, there will be only 37 Navy men remaining at the Institute.

Course VI Highest

The course with the highest enrollment at present is VI with a total of 473 men (39 of these in course VI-A) registered. Next in line is Mechanical Engineering with 350 men enrolled. The figures for other courses with more than 100 men are as follows: Course XVI, 341; Course X, 330; Course VIII, 185; Course XV, 152; and Course V, 129. Compare these figures with those for the number of students in each course in 1884. Then, there were only ten courses given in "the Tech on Boylston St." and the enrollment of regular students in those days was as follows: Civil Engineering, 30; Mechanical Engineering, 54; Mining Engineering, 29; Architecture, 10; Chemistry, 21; Electrical Engineering, 30; Natural History, 0; Medicine, 2; Physics, 1; and the General Course, 3.

V-12 Holds Dance At The Commander

Rhodes Scholarships Will Be Resumed; Special Awards Made For War Service

The Rhodes Scholarships for the United States will be resumed in 1946 with special allowance to students who have seen war service, it was announced recently by Prof. Walter H. Stockmayer of the department of Chemistry, who is handling the Scholarship at the Institute.

These grants entitle a student to two or three years' attendance in a wide scope of courses at England's Oxford University with an annual stipend of 400 pounds. Thirty-two Scholarships are annually assigned to the United States, in addition allowance has been made for an equal number of special War Service Scholarships for each of the next two years. Cyclotron Razing Rouses Compton

Attacks Policy Toward Japanese Scientists

Vehemently condemning "the wanton destruction by the Army of Japanese cyclotrons" in a letter to Robert P. Patterson, Secretary of War, President Karl T. Compton spoke in strong terms of this "act of utter stupidity which has seriously set back public confidence in the military."

The letter, dated December 4, continued, "This destruction will have the unfortunate effect of uselessly antagonizing those leaders of Japanese thought who were probably our best friends in that country."

Dr. Compton then told of his own participation in the drafting of regulations under which the Japanese nuclear scientists might carry on scientific work. Said he, "These plans were wholly adequate to safeguard against any Japanese work in this field which could possibly be dangerous. As a matter of fact, the cyclotron is not an instrument capable of producing atomic bombs. It is a scientific laboratory tool inadequate, by a very large factor, to produce explosive quantities of anything."

Speaking of the responsibility Dr. Compton says of General MacArthur, "I believe I know him well enough to be confident that he was not responsible for that order." The letter was written "in the hope that some way may be found to improve the situation which now permits such things to happen."

Applications for the next group of Scholarships must be submitted by November, 1946. Elections will be held the following month, and Scholars-elect will enter the University in October, 1947.

Under the ordinary Scholarship regulation, a candidate must be an unmarried American citizen with five years' residence, between 19 and 25 years of age at the time of his proposed entrance into Oxford, and at least a Junior in college when he applies.

For the War Service Scholarships the bar on marriage has been lifted, and the college standing lowered to Sophomore rating. The age limit has also been widened so that any War Service applicant who was between 19 and 25 at any time since October 1940 is eligible.

Swimming, Basketball Open Season

Tech Swims With Brown Tomorrow Afternoon, In First Meet Of Season

Meet At 3 P.M. In Alumni Pool, Everyone Invited

The Tech swimming team will hit the deep on its first intercollegiate meet of the season against Brown University in the Alumni Pool. The meet will begin promptly at three o'clock this Saturday afternoon. There will be no admission and everyone is welcome to attend.

The contest is to be the first for both teams, so no predictions as to the outcome can be made until the teams are observed under the strain which is present in an intercollegiate meet. Coach Smith, after watching his team practice every night has stated, while slyly smiling that, "Tech has a good chance of coming out on top and at any rate it should prove to be interesting as the meet will be closely contested all the way."

The first event of the meet will be a 300-yard medley race followed by the 220, and 50-yard crawls. Following this the diving events will take place; the two men diving for Tech are Schumacher and Lynes. The diving event will be followed by a 100-yard crawl, a 150-yard breast stroke, and the 440-yard crawl relay. Lt. Keifer, world's champion backstroke swimmer, will give an exhibition (see story). The final contest will be the 400 free style race.

This year the team has eight returned veterans and eight men from last year's team. The only man besides the divers whose position in the meet is known is Capt. Buckman, who is swimming in the 200-yard breast stroke race. The names of the rest of the members of the team and their relative positions on the team have been withheld for strategic purpose.

Indoor Track Meet Saturday Afternoon

Providing that the Boston weather will allow the squad to venture out on the track boards there will be an intramural handicap meet at three o'clock this Saturday. The meet will consist of three events, two laps, four laps and six laps.

Lieutenant (j.g.) Adolph Keifer, U.S.N.R., holder of the World's Record in the 150-yard Backstroke and 300-yard Individual Medley Events, will swim his specialties as an exhibition event of the Brown-M.I.T. opening home meet at the Alumni Pool on Saturday afternoon, December 8, at 3:00 P.M.

Lieutenant Keifer is now stationed at Camp Endicott, Davisville, Rhode Island, and expects to be transferred soon; so in all probability Keifer's appearance at the Tech Pool on Saturday will be his last public appearance in this locality for several months.

In addition to holding the World's Record in the 150-yard Backstroke and 300-yard Individual Medley Events, Keifer has held as many as 30 championship records. His exhibition will include not only the backstroke but the crawl and "butterfly" breaststroke, as well as several novelty events. His appearance at the meet has been arranged through the interest and cooperation of the Navy V-12 Personnel stationed at Tech.

V-12 Season Opens With Basketball Thirteen Teams In Intramural League

The Navy unit launched its intramural basketball league this week, and the early contests gave considerable promise for a good campaign this term. In spite of the fact that the Navy Personnel has decreased by seventy-five per cent since last winter, there are thirteen teams entered, two from each of five platoons, and three from the sixth. As a result everyone who wants to play basketball has an opportunity to compete on one of the teams. The caliber of play is somewhat lower than in previous years, as might be expected, but spirit is as high as ever.

One marked innovation this term has been allowing men from the M.I.T. varsity basketball squad to play in the intramurals. Team number eight representing the first platoon, company two,—has taken advantage of that fact by signing two varsity men to its roster. If Aitken and Meduski can find enough time off from Tech practice to compete regularly, their outfit will be a heavy favorite to top the league. The other teams all appear to be starting the campaign about evenly.

Wednesday night's games saw team number four display the strongest offense to date as they pulverized number three, 40 to 7. Erickson and Cahill led the scoring with six baskets apiece. In the other game scheduled, number thirteen won by forfeit from number twelve.

Tomorrow night at 8:30 the Tech quintet faces Harvard in the opening contest of the season at the Harvard Indoor Athletic Building near Harvard Square on Holyoke Street.

After a month of nightly practice in Walker Gym the starting lineup seems to be almost definitely set. Captain Ted Heuchling and Chuch Wellard, both regulars on last year's team, are scheduled to start at forward and guard respectively. The other three positions will be held down by men playing their first year of basketball for M.I.T. When the opening whistle blows, Everet Waldron will be at center, Jim Murphy at forward, and Oswald Honkalehto at guard. Until he sprained an ankle several days ago, Jack Aitken, another veteran of last year's team was a probable starter, but now it is doubtful whether he will be able to play at all. Thus the burden of relief for the regulars falls upon five men from last year's team and the nine newcomers who were chosen after a period of extensive tryouts earlier in the term.

Although Tech dropped both games with Harvard last season, the renewal of this cross-Cambridge rivalry promises plenty of excitement and spirit.

Tufts Next

After playing Harvard the team travels to Tufts for a game there on Wednesday. This game will also be spiritedly supported because part of the V-12 unit from M.I.T. was transferred to Tufts at the end of last term. The first home game for the Tech quintet will be on December 19 in the Walker court against Northeastern. The season, which extends till February, is scheduled for a total of fifteen games.

Starting Monday those interested in basketball will have an opportunity to play in the Walker gym. Coach McCarthy will direct proceedings from 4 till 5 nightly. If the turnout is sufficient, a few games will be scheduled.

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Debaters Oppose R.I. State, Andover Away From Home

Third Contest Listed; Tech Wins One, Drops Two In Recent Contests

Three debates are scheduled this weekend by the Debating Society with one this evening and two tomorrow.

Ralph H. Berman, 2-46, and James E. Stuart, '49, will tackle a Phillips Andover Academy team this evening at Andover. Technology will defend the affirmative of the subject, "Resolved: That arbitration by the federal government of all labor disputes in which the number of employees involved is 100 or more be made compulsory."

Two debates are scheduled for Saturday afternoon, December 8. Rhode Island State College will be host to the Technology team composed of Clarence S. Lyon, 2-46, and Harold A. Steiner, 2-47. The topic will be "Resolved: That the foreign policy of the United States should be directed toward the establishment of free trade among the nations of the world." The institute team will present the arguments for the negative.

The other debate tomorrow will be at Northampton High School. Two teams will journey to Northampton to argue both sides of the question, "Resolved: That one year of military training be required of every physically fit male citizen of the United States between the ages of 18 and 24 inclusive." The affirmative team is composed of Berman and Stuart, while the negative team consists of Lee Hanower, 10-44, and Joseph J. Baron, Jr., 2-48.

Last Friday, November 30, Technology defeated a host Columbia team by decision of the audience. There were no judges for that debate. In debates last Monday, Middlebury Women's College scored a victory here by decision of the audience, and Boston University edged out an Institute team. Judge for the latter debate was Lt. Comdr. F. C. Canfield, commander of the Navy V-12 Unit.

Vets' Association Hears Welsh On Bill Of Rights

The M.I.T. Veterans Association met last Wednesday at 5 P.M. in Room 6-120 to hear Mr. J. F. Welsh speak on pertinent points in Public Law 16, and the G.I. Bill of Rights. The talk was followed by a question period during which individual problems were discussed.

It was announced that elections of new officers would be held on December 19, when the Association will hold its next meeting.

M.I.T. Victory's Paper Published On The High Seas

Every day somewhere on the Seven Seas a little two page mimeographed newspaper, a namesake of *The Tech* makes its appearance for the diversion of several hundred returning G.I.'s. That is the *Tech Times* of the M.I.T. Victory, a Kaiser Liberty Ship named in honor of the Institute.

It is a friendly, little paper that combines world happenings with personal news, plus a little editorializing and advice to the returning G.I. Some of its issues arrived at the Institute through the medium of Robert L. Podell, 2-47, who is second assistant radio operator aboard the vessel.

In one issue, for example, we found reports of Primo Carnera's alibis after his recent pugilistic setback of Princess Margaret's appendectomy, and of the Austrian elections; also some serious thought about the Atomic Bomb, mixed with some rare old corn; example: "There was once an Idaho potato that married a Long Island potato. Soon they had a little sweet potato, and when the little potato grew up, it said: 'I want to marry Lowell Thomas!' but 'You can't!' shouted mamma, 'He's a commentator!'" (honestly this is a direct quote.)

The paper even goes so far as to praise the ship's cooks, something which must be practically unheard of in the Army. But after all the men have been living on K rations and worse for many months. This infant paper only in its 3rd volume, or trip, certainly seems to be accomplishing its purpose in making those last few days before home more bearable for returning servicemen.

T.C.A. Will Tutor Vets In 8.01, M11

Realizing that many veterans may wish assistance in the more technical freshman subjects, the Technology Christian Association has decided to conduct small tutoring classes in 8.01 and M11 for veterans only.

This instruction will be designed to supplement that received in the classroom, and tutoring classes will be about an hour in length, to be held two times a week for 8.01 and three times for M11. The project has received the approval of the Dean Harold E. Lobdell.

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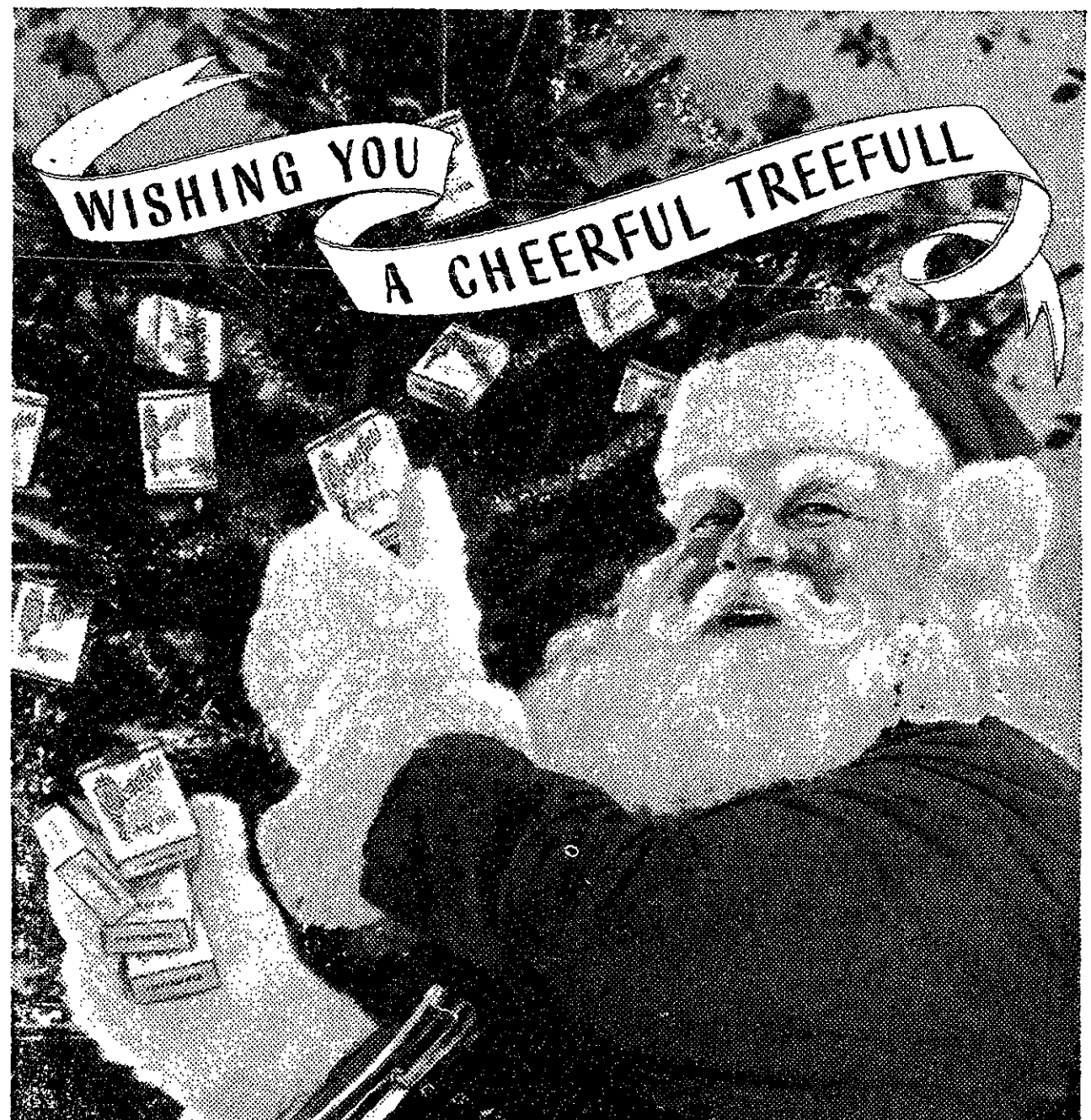
