Tech Hoopsters Beat Bates Five in 65-48 Victory

Watson Sparks Win As M.I.T. Quintet Excels; Heuchling High Scorer

Wednesday night at Walker Memorial Gym, the Tech courtmen handily trounced a fighting Bates quintet, 65-48. It was the second of the week for the Beavers over Maine five and only the third beat of the season for the visitors in 13 games. The M.I.T. men looked good at times and their shooting was accurate to the point of spectacular.

The first period saw the Beavers build up a ten-point lead before the visitors could register a basket. However, after this sudden spurge, the two teams settled down to an even first half. Bates, led by Gooch, made some seemingly impossible shots.

Magoun Concludes Winter Series Of Marriage Lectures

Emphasizing his statement that there should be more analysis and less love before marriage and more analysis and more love after marriage, Prof. F. Alexander Magoun yesterday concluded his winter series of marriage lectures sponsored by the T.C.A. About 600 people attended the fourth and last lecture, given at 4:00 P.M. and 5:00 P.M. in Huntington Hall. The subject of Prof. Magoun's talk was "Courtship."

"Courtship is common to all higher animals," said the professor, "and he called for more intelligent selection of a life partner. 'There should be a period of exploration,' he explained, in which a man could become acquainted with a number of women whom he considers are possible selections before making his final choice. Professor Magoun then told of a survey which showed that 50 per cent of the unmarried men questioned had not had any other women before their marriage."

Joyce Replaced By Captain Blair

Lieut. Commdr. Johnson Is Acting Exec. Officer

Yesterday Captain Roswell H. Blair replaced Captain Charles S. Joyce, U.S.N. (Ret.), as Commander of Naval Affairs at the Institute. Captain Blair had previously held the post of Executive Officer to Captain Joyce. Although a new Executive Officer has not yet been appointed by the Bureau of Personnel, Lieutenant Commander J. E. Johnson is now serving as Acting Executive Officer. Captain Blair was given the new post following his promotion from the rank of Commander, which was announced last week in *The Tech*.

Captain Joyce returned from retirement several years ago, and has been at Technology as officer in charge of all Navy men and as Professor of Naval Engineering. He enlisted in the Navy in 1899 and rose steadily through the ranks until he retired as Captain at the end of thirty years' service. In 1939, after spending ten years as a commander.

An exhibit on the Russian Urals has recently been placed in the lobby of Building 7 by the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship, Inc. The exhibit consists of a number of large-size photographs of mineral deposits, water ways, timber, theatres, chemical plants, steel mills, and munition factories, as well as photographs of eminent scientists and military men who live in the Urals.

Part of the exhibit is devoted to photographs and descriptions of how, because of the threat of the German invasion, the Russians were forced to move a large amount of their industry from the Ukraine to the Urals. Because of this migration, many thousands of Russian workers were forced to change a wilderness into a modern industrial region.

The Committee also voted down a proposal for a freshman smoker to be held for the incoming freshman Class of 10-47.

Freshman smokers have been an annual occurrence and have been held for all incoming classes except in the case of the Class of 2-46.

An additional appropriation of \$150 to supplement the Debating Society budget was approved by the Institute Committee. Also approved were a revised constitution for the Naval Architecture Society and amendments for the constitution of the Catholic Club.

The resignation of Walter F. Wagner, Committee representative for the Class of 2-47, was accepted. Announcement was made of the appointment of John J. Vozella, 6-45, and Robert W. Hanpeter, 2-47, to the Student-Faculty Committee. The Institute Committee also approved the new members of the Walker Memorial Committee which were announced two weeks ago in *The Tech*.

Dormitories Hold Bull-Session Dinner

The old Dormitory custom of "bull-session" dinners was revived Wednesday night when a group of dorm residents and faculty members gathered in Pritchett Hall for an evening of food and convivial conversation. Tech Squash Teams Win Over Exeter

Varsity at West Point For Match Tomorrow

Both Technology squash teams were victorious last Saturday at the Ellips Exeter Academy. The undefeated varsity edged out a close triumph, and the second team took the Exeter seconds, 4-1.

The varsity match proved to be the closest of the year for Tech. The score was two all in individual matches, Pierce and Hewson having won, Scherer and Toperzer having dropped their contests. Rog Sonabend, however, overcame a 2-1 deficit to win the match and the set, 3-2.

Two Matches This Week

Tomorrow the varsity will encounter the Military Academy at West Point. The lineup will be as follows: Sonnabend, Hewson, Pierce, Scherer, and Toperzer.

The Second Team next Wednesday will play the Middlesex Academy squash team there at 4:30. This is the second match for the team. Jos. Read, Dorflinger, Kornreich, and Bothfield will play in that order.

Intramural Play Progresses

Ski Team Places In West Point Meet

Tech Trackmen Trounce Brown

Score 42-41 Triumph In Freezing Weather

The M.I.T. track team ran roughshod over Brown last Saturday afternoon on the board track at Briggs Field to the tune of 42-21. Racing with the thermometer registering 28 degrees, the Beaver trackmen made grand slams in three events and placed high in the others, never allowing Brown a glimpse of victory after the initial event.

Brown took first and second in the 45-yard high hurdles, with O'Brien covering the distance in 6.4 seconds. He was followed by his teammate, Burton, and then Prigoff of Tech. Jerry Casey of the Beavers showed the way in the 50-yard dash with a time of 5.4 seconds. Tiedeman of Brown was second and Bill Grant of Tech scored in third place.

Poorman Wins Mile

In the next event, the one-mile, the Tech team scored a grand slam by placing one, two, three. Dick Poorman turned in the very good time of 4:46:2 and he was followed by Keegan and Ray in that order. This event was followed by the second Tech grand slam of the afternoon in the 600-yard run. Charlie Goldie turned in the great time of 1:17.6, with Shea and Schindel right behind.

The Beavers then took first and second in the 300-yard run, which was a very close event as the times indicate. Warren Chapman took the event in 34.5 seconds, followed by Jerry Casey in 34.6, and Fecht of Brown in 34.7. The 1,000-yard run was the third grand slam for Tech, with John Serrie winning in the good time of 2:23.4, with Crimin and Dickey placing second and third.

M.I.T. Mermen Crush W.P.I. For Fourth Win

Tech Swims Coast Guard Tomorrow; Collegiate Meet Here February 10

In the final dual meet of the season in the home pool last Saturday, the Tech mermen registered their fourth win in six starts by pounding Worcester Polytech, 58-16. Tomorrow afternoon M.I.T. will wind up the regular schedule against the Coast Guard Academy at New London. On the ensuing weekend competition for the year will come to a close when the New England Intercollegiate Swimming Association championship races are run off in the Alumni Pool.

In last week's meet, delayed two hours because of transportation difficulties encountered by the visiting W.P.I. team, Tech got off to a flying start by clinching the 300-yard medley relay and by taking first and second in the 220-yard freestyle event. W.P.I. then took first place in the 50 and 100-yard freestyle races to offset the eight points won by Eisenhardt and Goldfarb in the dives. Leading at this point by eighteen points, Tech continued to display its predominance as Mumford triumphed in the 150-yard backstroke. Buckman emerged in front in the 200-yard breaststroke, and Sherman won the 440-yard freestyle. M.I.T. capped its performance by handily winning the 400-yard relay.

Coast Guard Tough

By comparative scores tomorrow's match promises to be closely contested, for the Coast Guard team chalked up a 54-23 victory over Brown, which squad fell before Tech by the score of 47-28.

Activities Must Use Student Boards Only


