## Technology Club.

THE annual meeting of the Technology Club was held Thursday, Oct. 13. Reports from the secretary and treasurer showed a growth over former years. ## Senior Class Meeting.

The meeting was called to order by President Smith. After the reading of the minutes and the report of the treasurer, showing a balance on hand of \$85.12, the president urged a little more enthusiasm over the class elections and announced that a dinner would be given at the Union (tickets 50 cents) on the night of the elections, at which dinner the results of the elections would be announced.
