A Correction.

Through the misstatement of an official connected with Technology's new athletic field, THE TECH stated that the field was to be named after Mr. Wigglesworth. Mr. Wigglesworth has been, however, somewhat annoyed by the suggestion that the field should be named for him, and by the misstatement that the land and buildings were entirely his gift. The facts are, that the field was purchased by the Corporation through the generosity of Mr. Cabot, who donated his portion of the land. The improvements, which consist of a building for a grand stand and dressing rooms, were the gift of Mr. Wigglesworth. Neither of these gentlemen would consent to have his name attached to the field in any way. This fact augments, rather than diminishes the high regard and friendly feeling which the student body has for them both.

Hare and Hounds.

There are many men at Tech whose time is so occupied during the week that there is little of it left for recreation. These men may be desirous of exercise of a pleasing and exhilarating nature but they find it too inconvenient. The work of the gymnasium does not appeal to them, the work on the Track Team demands too much time. To these men the Hare and Hounds runs should appeal very strongly, and it is for these men in particular that the runs are planned. The Hare

and Hounds runs take place every Saturday afternoon, which every man can plan to have vacant, and are held in some of the suburbs of Boston so well adapted for this sort of exercise. The running is never severe and taxing, but is always accommodated to the slowest runner. Thus is produced a reaction from the week's grinding, which by the aid of a shower bath, provided wherever it is possible, invigorates the runner and he returns home with new life for the following week's work.
