TECHNOLOGY FIELD DAY.

Conditions Governing the Events.

The football game will start promptly at 2.15 p.m., between eleven men from each class. The game to be two 25-minute halves, with a rest of 10 minutes between the halves. Current rules governing Intercollegiate football games to apply.

A relay race of a mile and a half to be run by twelve men from each class, each man to run one-eighth of a mile. The sequence of runners shall be assured by the passing of flags from man to man, (these flags to be provided by the management.) The rules governing New England Intercollegiate relay races will apply. The relay race will be run immediately at the close of the first half of the football game.

A tug-of-war will be pulled immediately after the second half of the football game, and rules governing this competition are posted separately.

Points will be counted as follows: Football game, four (4) points; relay race, three (3) points; tug-of-war, two (2) points.

Numerals will be awarded to members of both the football teams actually participating in the game, not exceeding eighteen, the seven substitutes to whom numerals may be given, to be designated by the captain or manager of the team, by letter to the Chairman of the Advisory Council, on Friday, Nov. 11.

Also to the members of the winning relay team and two substitutes, the latter to be named on the day previous to the games.

The management of the games and all matters connected with same is vested in the Advisory Council, and may be delegated to any sub-committees they may appoint.

Football and whistles, flags for relay race, and flags and rope for tug-of-war, will be provided by the Advisory Council.

All referees, umpires, timers and other officials shall be appointed by the Advisory Council.

Any protest in connection with the above rules, must be filed with the Chairman of the Advisory Council not later than Saturday, Oct. 31.

List of Events and Limits.

This year the Fall Handicap Meet will be held at the new athletic field in Brookline, on Saturday, October 29. This meet is the only handicap meet of the year, and is an excellent opportunity to make a good showing for this year's track team. The 220-yard dash especially, should have a large list of entries from 1907 and 1908, as it affords a preliminary training for the relay race on Field Day. The prizes will be arranged for later. An entry book will be found in the Gymnasium, where any one intending to compete, should sign his name. The following is a list of the events:

110-yard dash, 8 yards limit; 220-yard dash, 15 yards limit; 440-yard run, 30 yards limit; 880-yard run, 50 yards limit; 1-mile run, 100 yards limit; 2-mile run, 200 yards limit; 120-yard high hurdles, 10 yards limit; 220-yard low hurdles, 20 yards limit; high jump, 1 foot limit; pole vault, 2 foot limit; 16-pound shot put, 6 foot limit; broad jump, 2 foot limit; 16-pound hammer throw, 20 foot limit; discus throw, 20 foot limit.
