Under the present rules of the Technology Club, no undergraduate member of the Institute is admitted to membership, until after the middle of his junior year, that is after the first of April. This rule shuts out and prevents a number of men from enjoying the privileges of the Club until their senior year, as in the latter part of the junior year, or in fact any year, comes the greatest effort on the students' part to pull through. Few Juniors, then, care to join in April, and so interest in the Technology Club is lessened.

To make the membership appeal more to the undergraduate body, we would suggest that membership be open after the beginning of the junior year, and that more publicity be given in regard to the aims and advantages of the Technology Club. Very few men at the Institute know about the Club, and it is highly desirable that they should be informed, as they are the men, who will after graduation, if not before, become the active members of the organization.

Class Relay Teams.

Much confusion seems to exist this year in regard to the number of men who will make up the class relay teams. On Field Days 1902 and 1903 the number of men was twelve, each man running one-sixth of a mile. During the next year the changes in the track at Charles River

Park increased the distance around it to one-fifth of a mile. To meet this change, the relay teams of 1904 were decreased to ten men each.

Now that we have our new athletic field a standard distance has been established. The track is a quarter-mile track. Each man will run 220 yards, and the whole distance will be one and one-half miles. The number of men who will on this year's Field Day make up a relay team is therefore twelve.
