## GOLF TOURNAMENT.

Amherst Wins at Springfield.

The first round in the New England Intercollegiate Tournament took place Wednesday afternoon at the Springfield Country Club Golf Course, and resulted in victories for M. I. T. and Amherst over Williams and Brown respectively. Both matches were well contested, M. I. T. winning 8-5, and Amherst 9½-5½.

The most closely contested matches were played between Pfeil and A. Mitchell of Williams, and Krag and Gregory of Williams, in which Pfeil was outpointed 2-1, while Krag won by a reversal of the same score. Williams, however, could not overcome the lead scored by Gilmer who blanked Clapp.

## DISTINGUISHED VISITORS

Study Our Methods

The Institute was recently honored by the presence of several distinguished visitors.

The first was Sir William H. White, President of the British Institute of Civil Engineers, chief constructor for the British Navy, and Consulting Engineer of the British Admiralty. As the various technical schools of Great Britain have different standards for entrance, Sir Wm. White is studying American standards, with the purpose of getting a definite standard for the British schools.

He was well pleased with the Naval Architectural Department, which was shown to him by Professor Peabody, because of its well-equipped and convenient rooms. Captain Hovgaard, Instructor in this Department, at one time studied under Sir William. Mr. Harrison Smith showed him the Electrical Engineering Laboratory, explaining the method of instruction, and Professor Lanza took him through the Mechanical Engineering Laboratories. He seemed to be very much pleased with both.

Sir Wm. White was accompanied by United States Naval Instructor Taylor.

Three delegates sent by the Prussian Government, Professor Götte of Charlottenburg; the principal of the Mechanical Engineering School at Stettin, and the director of the school at Schmalkalden.

Mrs Richards Leaves to Attend a Meeting in St. Louis.

Mrs. Ellen H. Richards leaves Boston for St. Louis, on Saturday, October 22, to attend the annual convention of the Collegiate Alumnae Association to be held November 2 to 5.

She will speak at the universities of Illinois, Kansas and Missouri, and at Cincinnati on sanitary and economic matters before her return November 9.

The sanitary exhibit under the auspices of the association has received a grand prize, and Mrs. Richards has been awarded a gold medal for its installation.

## TRACK TEAM.

Preliminary Work Good.

The support of the track team during the past week has been unusually good, the number of men on some occasions being as many as one hundred.
