## GENERAL NEWS.

The imports of electrical telegraphic, telephonic, etc., apparatus into Egypt during the years 1901, 1902 and 1903, were valued at about \$210,000, \$276,000 and \$338,900, respectively. Of these, Great Britain led with the lion's share each year. The United States comes ninth with a total of \$8,965.

The new mining law adopted by the Santo Domingo Government is very favorable to investment and development by foreign capital. Anyone may take out a permit to prospect on payment of a deposit to cover damages; owners of lands have preference, but must pay prospectors' disbursements plus one-third the value of the mine, concessions are issuable on thirty days' notice, in conformity with local customs; mines are exempt from export duties and all taxes except 60 cents per acre annually for precious metal mines, and 30 cents per acre for base metal mines.

Andrew Carnegie has given Dickinson College \$50,000, to be used in completing "Conway Hall."
