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INSTITUTE COMMITTEE.

Students' Opinion Stated.

At a meeting of the Institute Committee, held Friday noon, the following officers were elected temporarily: President, W. D. B. Motter; Vice-president, H. L. Williams; Secretary and Treasurer, Nugent Fallon. H. L. Williams was elected to represent the Institute Committee on the Advisory Council. A motion was passed requesting the presidents of the four classes to urge their class men to comply with President Pritchett's request for written statements of facts regarding the affair of last Wednesday night, and a committee consisting of J. P. Lawton and Norman Lombard was elected to draw up a statement expressing the students' opinion of the so-called riot.

At a meeting held Saturday morning, it was voted to issue the following statement:

Inasmuch as some action on the part of the student body at Technology, regarding the so-called riot of last Wednesday night in front of Rogers Building, seems to be called for by the general public, the Institute Committee, the official representative of the student body, makes the following statement:

Technology's tradition is to mount Rogers steps after all student gatherings to cheer and sing. As this privilege has never been denied, and the custom has never proved annoying, it was naturally to be supposed that we would mount the steps after the parade of last Wednesday night. If the students had been allowed to govern their own actions, and had not been molested by the police, there would have been no great disorder and the students would have quietly dispersed. In view of this fact, the action of the police seems to be entirely unwarranted.

The following resolution was also passed at this meeting:

Resolved, That the Institute Committee, the official representatives of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, express its appreciation of the kindly feeling of interest and sympathy shown by the men of Harvard University for the men of Technology since the deplorable affair of last Wednesday night.

If you will come at your earliest opportunity, the lawyers will make an appointment to talk with you fully.

Mr. Taintor has been retained by President Pritchett, and his request should receive the consideration given one from the President himself.

President Pritchett Addresses Freshmen.

President Pritchett addressed the Freshman Class in Huntington Hall, Saturday morning at 11 o'clock. The president spoke of the disturbance of Wednesday night last, and touched upon the relations between Harvard and Tech.

Sophomore Class Meeting.

The Sophomore class held a meeting in Room 6, Lowell, Friday, November 4, at 4 P.M. The object of the meeting was to let the class as a whole know how Field Day preparations were progressing. The Field Day Committee announced that arrangements had been completed with the management of the Globe Theatre to have everything satisfactory for Tech students on the evening of November 12. An assessment of 50 cents was voted to support the Field Day Committee. President Leavell urged the class to come forward and help the different interests of Field Day as much as possible, as this is the last year that the class of 1907 will be directly connected with it.
