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Walker Memorial Library.

Several instances of this have come to our attention of late, not the least of which is the donation of a number of books on athletics and gymnastics, which are now placed in the General Library. The collection is to be known as the Walker Memorial Library, and contains about 375 books and ten magazines, and is one of the finest collections of its kind in existence. 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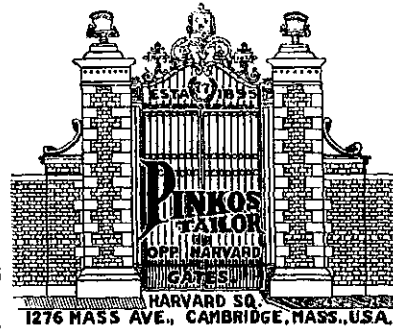
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
