## NEW PRESIDENT AT U. OF VA.

**President Fritchett and Prof. Lanza Leave to Attend Inauguration.**

Dr. Fritchett leaves this afternoon and Prof. Lanza left yesterday, to attend the inauguration of President E. A. Alderman of the University of Virginia. Many of the large colleges are sending delegates to the inauguration, and the audience at the ceremonies will include many men notable in the field of education. The inauguration exercises begin to-morrow and last through the remainder of the week. Dr. Fritchett and Prof. Lanza will be back to Boston the first part of next week.

During his stay in Virginia Prof. Lanza will be the guest of Prof. Smith, who spoke at the Rogers' Commemoration exercises held during the winter.

## SOCIETY OF CHEMICAL INDUSTRY.

At the first meeting of the New England Section of the Society of Chemical Industry, recently organized, the following officers were elected: Chairman, Henry Howard, M. I. T., '89, of the Merrimac Chemical Company; Treasurer, Godfrey Cabot, Manufacturing Chemist; Secretary, Dr. W. H. Walker of the Institute.

The Society of Chemical Industry was founded in England in 1881 for the advancement of the study and practice of Applied Chemistry, and the diffusion of information upon all matters connected with the Chemical Industries. The well-known *Journal* of the Society is issued in London twice a month.

The Society has at present 3,800 members in all parts of the world, and local Sections have previously been formed in New York and in Canada. The New England Section just formed is the tenth local Section of the general Society.
