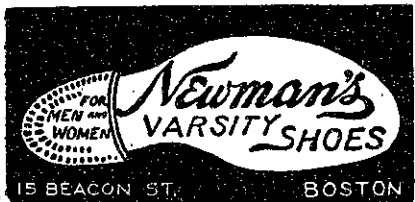

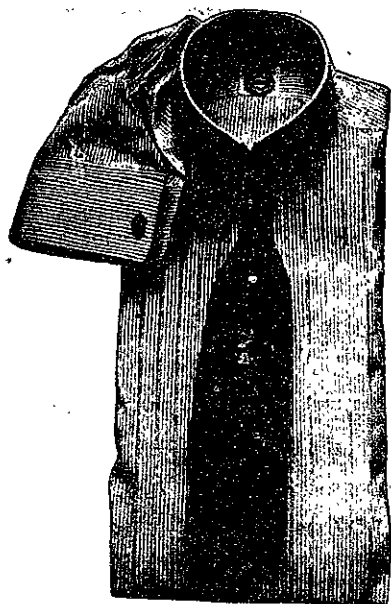

**CO-OPERATIVE REPORT.**

The financial report of the Co-operative Society for 1905 shows that the past year has been one of exceptional growth and the most successful year in the history of the Society.

The growth is due largely to the greater use of tickets by the upper classmen. The membership in 1903-4 was 477, while last year it was 573, showing an increase of nearly 100. A greater use has been made of tickets in the patronage of the affiliated lists, as shown, for example, by the rebates on purchases from the Continental Clothing House, \$688.28 having been paid to members as rebates on their purchases. The rebate in 1903 was \$431.89. The sales at the Co-operative branches have likewise increased over that of last year, showing more universal use by the student body.

The appropriation has exceeded that of last year. In 1902, \$612.50 was awarded; 1903, \$887.50; 1904, \$900; and last year \$1000 was distributed to students. Thirteen received \$75 each, and onestudent \$25. During the existence of the Society \$9712 has been distributed and 84 needy students have been assisted.

The amount carried forward as a balance for last year was \$480; for this year a balance of \$530 is left, showing an increase here of \$50.

The officers for the present year are: Francis G. Baldwin, President; Frederick B. Guest, Vice-President; Alexander Macomber, Secretary; A. D. Maclachlan, Treasurer.
