SOPOMORES 0; WALTHAM 22.

1908 Lacks Team Play.—Waltham Well Trained.—Two Thousand Watch Game.

The Sophomore football team was defeated by the Waltham High School team in Waltham, Saturday afternoon, by a score of 22 to 0. The Sophomores played a plucky, consistent game, but lost because of their opponents' better training and better team work. A squad of twenty-two men was taken out by Captain Glover, and Coach Ball gave every man his turn.

White, of Waltham, made three touchdowns, running twice from the forty-yard line. After he got started, no one seemed able to touch him.

The Sophomore team has material which should improve with training; most of the men appear to be hard players. Coach Ball thought that if the team had kept to their instructed style of play more closely, the outcome would have been different.

The occasion was made a citizens' testimonial to the Waltham team and coach, in recognition of the work that has been done this year. The Waltham team has already won four games. Nearly two thousand people were present today.

Fine Class Spirit.—Talk by President Pritchett.—The New Officers.

One hundred and sixty men attended the annual dinner of the Sophomore Class at the Union, Saturday evening. The best of feeling was shown, and it was one of the most successful class dinners ever held. Messrs. Blackstein and Burrison were the guests. President McGuigan acted as Toastmaster.

Mr. Blackstein told a few humorous stories. Mr. Burrison urged the need of social gatherings and strong class organization, and cited several personal experiences which proved his point. He ended by expressing a wish that that the future would be illustrious for 1908.

A letter from Mr. Rand was read in which he expressed his regret that he could not be present at the dinner. He urged the men to go out for the class teams, and closed his letter with the toast "Here's to 1908; may she win Field Day."

F. H. McGuigan, in his speech as retiring president, urged also the great need of a strong class organization and the great good that is done when a class heartily supports its teams.

At this point Mr. Rand arrived and was loudly cheered. He gave one of his inimitable talks. He said that often when he had sat in his two by nine office all summer and had received no calls from students, he realized what it meant to have the fellows around. He again appealed to the men to go out for the class teams and also for the 'varsity teams.

In the midst of Mr. Rand's talk, President Pritchett also arrived, and later told of the German and English Universities he visited this last summer.

FIELD DAY PROSPECTS.

1909's Chances.—Enthusiasm in Class Meeting Alone Does Not Win Field Day.

With Field Day for 1905 only a month away, and one-third of the practice time already past, the question of the outcome has become a topic of interest. The Sophomores are fairly well known, but as to the Freshmen, all is speculation.

So far, only the football team is out for practice, therefore nothing can be said about the relay race and the tug-of-war. It can be said, however, that if the Freshmen want to make a creditable showing in the football game with the Sophs, they must take a big brace and that very soon. The first cause for complaint is the small squad. No coach can make a successful team out of a small squad. There must be keen competition for every position and at least enough men to make up two teams. So far the men out for the line positions are light and the whole squad seems to lack the spirit of fight and readiness that is essential to a successful team.

What the squad needs most is the co-operation of the whole class. The class is perfectly ready to respond to a call for a meeting in Huntington Hall and to cheer heartily for 1909, but this will not make a football team. A football team is only to be made in one way, viz: First, all who are able to play come out in football togs; Second, those who are not players come out and cheer on the teams at every practice, making them feel that the class is behind them to a man. This cheering at practice is what puts snap and vigor into a team. Many and many a tired player, felt a new spring in his muscles when his name was called out by his classmates. Practice must have the semblance of a game if it is to be good practice. Men cannot go on day after day without encouragement.
