A great mass meeting for young men will be held in Tremont Temple at 8.30 P.M., Sunday, October 29, under the auspices of the Boston Christian Endeavor Union. President Pritchett of the Institute of Technology will speak on "The Young Man in Business." The Hon. Guy Andrews Ham, assistant United States district attorney, will speak on "The Young Man as a Citizen," and Dr. P. S. Henson will speak on "The Young Man and the Church." H. E. Washburn, who has conducted all the large Endeavor choruses of late years, is training a men's choir to sing. Dr. W. T. McElveen, president of the Boston Christian Endeavor Union, and Miss Carrie A. Bramhall, vice-president, have made a programme that is expected to attract 3,000 young men to the Temple.
