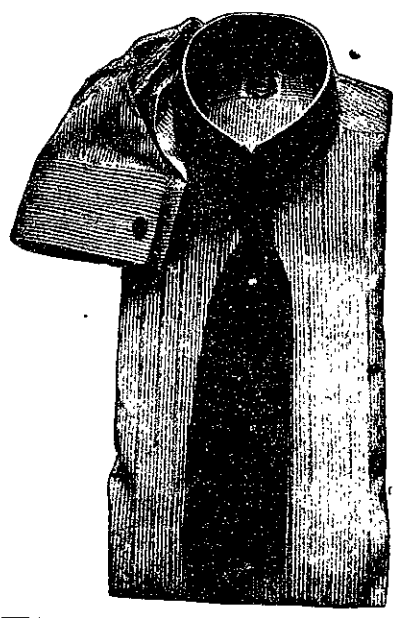

LOWELL INSTITUTE LECTURE.

An appreciative audience of five hundred people was present at the third lecture of the Lowell Institute series, given last evening in Huntington Hall. Geo. W. Knox, D.D., L.L.D., Professor of the History and the Philosophy of Religion at the Union Theological Seminary of New York City, was the lecturer of the evening. His subject deals with the far-eastern religions, Buddhism, Confucianism, and the primitive religions of Japan. This was the second of a series of six lectures on this subject. The next lecture will be given next Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

SMALL FRESHMEN SQUADS.

The Freshmen squads in football, relay, and tug-of-war are too small. Only an average of twenty men report daily for the football team, there is more than the same number out for the relay, and in the tug-of-war, although fifty or so candidates are on the books, the usual crowd is thirty. YALE WINS GOLF.

The annual tournament of the Intercollegiate Golf Association held at Garden City, L. I., Wednesday, was won by Yale. The other entries were Princeton, Harvard, Pennsylvania and Columbia. The qualifying round of the individual championship was played yesterday.

NEW PRESIDENT AT ILLINOIS

The installation of President James of the University of Illinois will take place in about a month, the ceremony extending over three days. Besides having the usual characteristics of such functions, the ceremony will take the form of a civic demonstration, intending to emphasize the intimate organic connection of the University with the education and administration of the State and Nation. Other colleges and Universities will be invited to send delegates to these ceremonies.
