Sophomores Play Loose Game Against Lighter Team.

FRESHMEN PLAY TIE GAME.

Teams Evenly Matched.—Both Fail to Score.

The Freshman football team met its equal when it played the Colonial Athletic Club of Jamaica Plain on the Tech Field Saturday afternoon. The latter's team was more or less of a picked one and put up a good game although they had had little practice.

There were many fumbles made and neither team gained well on the offense, but both held strongly, and notwithstanding that each side was offered a good chance for a touchdown no scoring was done.

The playing by the Freshmen was too individual for good team work, the interference of the backs was poor, and the ends were drawn in too far on the defence. The kicking was short except for one punt made by Wentworth, '09, in the second half which was fumbled and the ball downed by a Tech man, very near the goal line of the Colonials. The longest run was one of twenty yards made by L. Kelley of the Athletic Club.

LOWELL INSTITUTE LECTURE.

The second lecture of the first course in the Lowell Institute series by Dr. James Ford Rhodes, held Friday evening in Huntington Hall, was characterized by a sweeping criticism of the ideas of Charles Sumner, the Massachusetts Senator, on Reconstruction and Negro Suffrage. Dr. Rhodes maintained that Sumner's attempt to immediately bring about universal suffrage and equal relations between the two races in the South was a great injustice to the white, inasmuch as its success would have overthrown countless established institutions. Sumner's policy stands out in striking contrast to that of President Lincoln and Governor Andrew, who wished to propitiate, and not take advantage of, their defeated foe.

The next lecture of this course will be held tomorrow evening. This evening Prof. Knox of the Union Theological Seminary will give his third lecture on the far-eastern religions.

Princeton has thirty-five candidates for the cross country team.

ARCHITECTURAL SOCIETY.

Successful Meeting Held at the Union Friday Evening.
