PROF. WILHELM OSTWALD.

Prof. Wilhelm Ostwald of the University of Leipsic, gave the first of a series of lectures on "The Historical Development of Physical Chemistry" in 22 Walker. He traced the history of chemistry from the time of the ancients up to modern times. The remainder of the lectures will be given in German.

CLASS MEETINGS.

Sophomores Told That Order Must be Preserved at the Theatre.

He said that after last year's affair with the police the Institute could not afford to do anything which would cause unfavorable comment in the press, and he urged every man to do his best to uphold the reputation of M. I. T.

A few matters of minor importance were brought up for discussion, but all final action was postponed until Friday's meeting. President Weinz announced that all matters dealing with Field Day would be arranged at the next meeting, and he called on every man in the class to be present then.

1909 CLASS MEETING.

Following Dr. White's talk a meeting of the Freshman Class was held. A resolution not to begin any rough house Saturday night at the Theatre was passed.

An opportunity was given to those who had not already done so to sign the Constitution, and after some practice in cheering the meeting came to an end.

COMMUNICATION.
