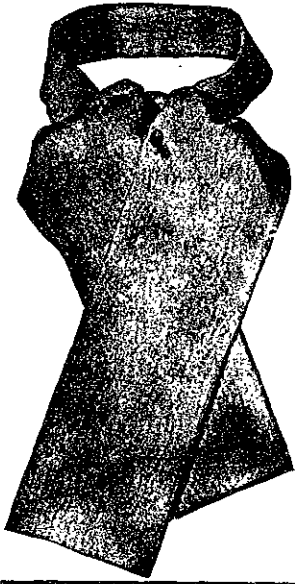


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TECHNIQUE 1907.

spoke of the proper arrangement of light for reading, and the care of the ears. Eight hours of sleep he considered a minimum requirement. Many will need more.
 After a few words about the treatment of sleeplessness, he spoke of the use of alcohol and tobacco. He said that while in moderate amounts their use is only occasionally the cause of serious trouble their use means in all cases a slight handicap, at least, in favor of the man who does not use them.
 Dr. White's next talk will be on "What to Do in Emergencies," and on minor complaints, such as colds.

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TALK BY DR. WHITE.
 Dr. White, the medical adviser for *Technology*, gave his first lecture on "Personal Hygiene" in Huntington Hall, Wednesday afternoon, at half past three o'clock.
 He spoke of bathing, exercise, clothing, of the proper care of the eyes and ears, of the amount of sleep required, and finally with regard to the use of alcohol or tobacco.
 In speaking of bathing he limited his remarks to the cold bath as a stimulant, and said that, for young men at least, warm baths were not often desirable.
 Dr. White spoke only of the exercise used as a means of keeping up one's general health. With regard to clothing he said that wrapping up excessively was to be avoided. He
