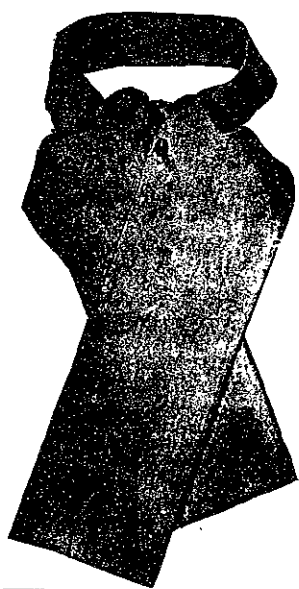

FIELD DAY DINNER.

The Annual Field Day Dinner will be held at the Tech Union to-night at 6.30 P.M., for all men who participated in any way in the events of Field Day.

The following article is from the Daily Cardinal of the University of Wisconsin: "A meeting of the senior mechanical and electrical engineers has been held and it was decided to take, as has been the custom in former years, a trip through the east. As yet no definite time has been agreed upon, nor is it decided what cities will be included in the itinerary, but the cities which offer the best opportunities to witness the practical working of the theories of engineering will be included."

The Carnegie Lake at Princeton will require three years for completion. Work was begun last summer.

William Jennings Bryan has given the University of South Dakota \$400, the proceeds from which are to be given as prizes for best essays in Science of Government.

Registration at Harvard this year shows a decrease in the number of students. The College has ninety-three students less, the Law School fourteen less, the Graduate School twenty-one more, and the Medical School ten more. The total registration figures show 3,865 students this year against 4,004 at this time last year.
