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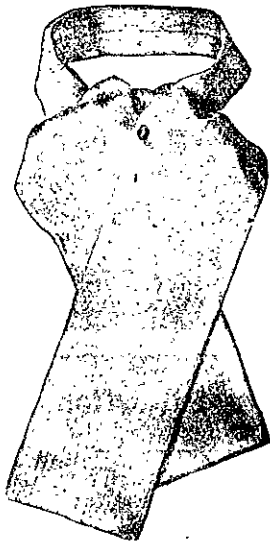

### GROWTH OF DARTMOUTH.

The opening of Dartmouth for its 137th year, Thursday morning was marked by conditions unique among American colleges. Enrollment in the different classes, though not fully complete, will exceed the last previous enrollment of the college by at least 150. Without regarding the graduate students or those in the associated schools, the numbers for the college are as follows: Seniors, 120; Juniors, 205; Sophomores, 300; Freshmen, 350; making a total of 1045.

The growth is about a year ahead of the preparations which the college is making for its own increase.

### GLEE CLUB TRIALS.

The Glee Club held their first trials last Saturday afternoon at the Tech Union. There were only fifteen men present, and the management urgently requested that a larger number of men come out. To arrange it so that no one can plead that they did not have an opportunity at the trials, any man can have a hearing before or after a rehearsal. The next rehearsal will be held at 4.15 next Friday afternoon at the Tech Union, and all the men that were for some reason or another kept away from the trials last Saturday should make it a point to be on hand then.
