SOPHOMORES AT WORK.

1909 Teams Expected to Reverse Experience of Last Fall.

The Sophomores, realizing the importance of winning on Field Day, have determined to leave no stone unturned to gain a decisive victory over their present rivals. Men are being actively sought for the various branches of athletics, and a strong list of candidates has already reported for each team. Most of the members of last year's teams have returned and some promising new men have been found. With the lesson learned last year, and the hard work being done now, the prospects of 1909 are excellent.

Only twelve men have reported for track so far, but several more have expressed their intention to come out, and twenty candidates are expected at Tech Field before the end of the week.

Twenty-three men reported at the Gymnasium, Monday afternoon for the tug-of-war team. Coach Wouson, '07, who trained so successful a team last fall, and Manager Bundy took the men in hand and coached them on the means of attaining a maximum efficiency. After a short practice, the men were dismissed with instructions to bring out all possible candidates. Practice will be held every afternoon, except Saturday, at the Gymnasium, at 4 P.M., and a strict record of attendance will be kept.

The 1909 Football Team practiced Saturday afternoon at Tech Field, and Monday afternoon at the Oval. They were coached by McDonald, formerly coach for Worcester Academy and the Harvard Freshmen.

FRESHMAN ATHLETICS.

1910 Hard at Work in Preparation for Field Day.

The Freshmen, with the help and advice of the Juniors, are making strenuous efforts to get into shape for their first Field Day. All the teams are receiving excellent support, and the candidates are showing that they are out to win.

About twenty men have reported for football up to date, and though they lack something in weight, they make it up in speed and spirit. They will have every advantage of coaching and training.

Fifteen men reported at Tech Field for track practice Monday and about the same number yesterday. As these were the first two days of training, the work was very light, consisting only in a few easy jogs and practice in taking starts. It is too early to predict the future of the team, but several of the men are said to have interscholastic reputations, and a fast team is expected.

Candidates for the 1910 Tug-of-War Team reported for the first time Monday afternoon at the Gym. Manager Fitzwater, assisted by Webb, '08, gave the men preliminary instructions as to practice, but no actual work was done. TECH CHAMBERS.

Improvements Made During the Summer in Home of Many Tech Men.

Several important changes have been made in the Tech Chambers during the last summer that were designed to add to the attractiveness of the place for students of Technology. Another story has been added to the building, the whole dining room has been remodeled and four bowling alleys have been installed in the basement.

The regular plan of the rooms on the other floors has not been followed in the rooms on the seventh floor. They have been built larger, and over half of them have private baths. This adds to the Chambers one feature that has long been desired by many of their patrons.

Any one who ate at the Tech Chambers last year remembers the delay that was occasioned by the kitchen being in the basement. This has been rearranged this year, and the dining room and kitchen are both on the first floor. This will help very materially in the effort of the management to serve meals more promptly. The dining room has been still further altered, a lunch counter having been put in at which students can get their meals still more quickly and at a reduced price.

The bowling alleys are strictly first class and will add materially to the amusement features of the place, which already include a pool room, a reading room, a gymnasium and a swimming pool.
