THE CHESS CLUB.

The second meeting this year of the Tech Chess Club was held yesterday in 26 Rogers at 1 o'clock. Members of last year's club, new men coming out for the team, and others interested in chess were present. Plans were formulated for the coming season. Technology is a member of the Metropolitan Chess League, comprising the following clubs: Boston Chess Club, Union Chess Club, Morphy Club, Dorchester Chess Club, Harvard Chess Club, Jamaica Plain Chess Club, Newton Y. M. C. A. and Technology. The following regulations in addition to the regular rules of chess have been adopted by the league: Games to be played by the clock, 40 moves during first two hours, 20 moves per hour afterwards; unfinished games to be continued within one week; a sealed envelope to be deposited with committee as a record of progress of game, if a match is adjourned; either team failing to appear loses match, and the match only counts as a league match if played according to schedule.

A strong team is promised Tech this year, as many older members of the club are back. The following men will represent Tech: S. F.

It has been decided not to hold a tournament this year as the numerous outside competitions will take so much time. There will be fourteen league games, and it is intended also to arrange matches with Dartmouth and Andover.

The officers for the year are: President, S. F. Nelson, '08; Vice-President and Manager, F. W. Morrill, '07; Secretary and Treasurer, S. F. Barnett, '09. The present membership of the club is about twenty.

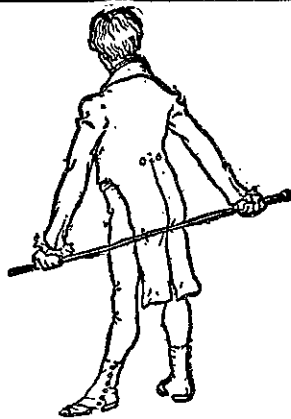

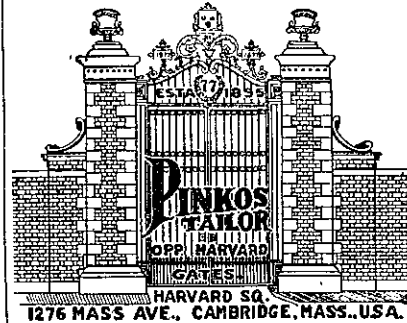
