FIELD DAY REGULATIONS

The Tech has received the following communication from the Advisory Council:

No one will be admitted without a ticket or a badge; officials, marshals and competitors will be provided with badges, and competitors will obtain same through the managers of their respective teams.

All officials, marshals and competitors, including managers and coaches of teams are invited to dine at the Union on November 17 at 6.30 P.M.

The following rules must be observed on Field Day by spectators, substitutes, officials, marshals and others:

During the football game, the substitutes, football coach, and officials directly connected with the game will be allowed upon the field, and all others will not be allowed to approach nearer the side lines than the edge of the track, and then only on the North side of the field.

During the relay race, only runners and the officials connected with this particular race will be allowed on the field.

During the tug-of-war, only the teams and officials will be allowed on the field.

At no time will men be allowed between the teams and the spectators in the observation stands, except the four marshals who will be detailed to particularly enforce this rule.

HOCKEY CLUB.

The Hockey Club held a meeting in 22 Rogers yesterday noon and discussed ways and means of getting a rink and also money with which to run a team. The advisory Council has come to the decision that it cannot support both a hockey team and a basketball team, and the former will have to suffer in consequence.
