## TECH SHOW BEGINS WORK.

Meeting of Candidates Held at the Union Wednesday and Play Outlined.

Tech Show started with a rush Wednesday afternoon, two weeks ahead of last year's performance. One hundred and fifty men were on hand for registration as candidates, ninety being out for principal parts.

The play this year is a musical comedy entitled "William, Willie and Bill," and is of a much lighter nature than "The Freshman." The scene is laid in a summer hotel and the atmosphere is entirely collegiate. A number of new specialties will be introduced, leaving to the plot a much less important place than in "The Freshman." In all there will be a cast of sixty, of which ten are principals.

The management has started in with a push and energy that should go far toward making the Show a success. The first rehearsal for the principals took place yesterday afternoon at four, and the chorus starts the first of next week. This gives a start of two weeks over last year and James Francis, the coach, said that this start, combined with the excellence of the book and music, will produce the best Tech Show ever staged. This is no mean promise, for the Show stands far above all other amateur theatricals in Boston.

In picking the men four things will be considered: acting, adaptability to the part, attendance at rehearsals, and standing in studies. This last requirement is insisted on in order that no man shall be able to use the Show as an excuse for failure in his work and thus give it a bad name with the Faculty.

Not only are men wanted for the cast but five places on the business staff are open to underclassmen. General Manager Macomber has charge of the entire performance and under him are Stage Manager Stewart, '08, and Business Manager McCready, '08, each with two assistants, and the new officer, Advertising Agent McMillin, '07, with one assistant. It is for these assistants that the management wishes underclassmen to try. The Colonial Theater has been engaged for two matinee performances in Boston on the afternoons of April 25 and 26, the Malden Auditorium for the evening of April 26, and the Providence Opera House for the evening of April 27.

The author of the book, E. W. James, '07, will be unable to see his play produced, for he has accepted a civil service position in the Philippines and left Boston yesterday for his post.

## SERVICE AT TRINITY CHURCH.

On Sunday evening, February 17, at 8 P.M., there will be a special night service in Trinity Church, Boston. The preacher will be Rev. George Hodges, D.D., Dean of the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge. The service will be preceded by a ten minute organ recital. All sittings at the night service are free, and the public are cordially invited to attend.

## TECH LOSES TO TUFTS.

Both Basketball Teams are Defeated after Fierce Contests.

In two fast and hard-fought contests, Tufts twice defeated Tech at the latter's gymnasium Wednesday evening. Tufts' varsity won from Tech' varsity, 28 to 11, while Tufts second defeated Tech second, 29 to 24. The games were fierce and rough from the very start, and the Tech fives lost mainly through their inability to pass the ball and to find the basket.

The first half of the 'varsity game ended with the score 9 to 4 in Tufts favor, but in the second half the Medford men played all around Technology and had no trouble in adding 19 points to their score. Dwelly of Tufts was the star, throwing seven baskets from the floor.

The second teams were more evenly matched and the close score which prevailed throughout the game made the men play a fierce, hard game. Pettingill of Tech was the star, throwing five baskets, one of them a long one-handed shot from the middle of the floor.

Neglect on the part of the Tufts management necessitated the engagement of two Tufts men as judges, and Coach Fournon was forced to protest against many of their decisions. Up to time of going to press last night the meet was unfinished, each team having won two bouts and two bouts being undecided.

## WILL WIN TIME PRIZE.

Coach Mahan Says Relay Team is Fast and Will Make Record.

Technology will be represented by an unusually strong team this year in the coming B. A. A. games. Not only will there be an exceptional relay team to run against Holy Cross, but there will be Tech men in two invitation events and in the open events.

The big event of the evening for Tech men, of course, is the relay race with Holy Cross. Technology has one of the fastest relay teams that it ever had. Coach Mahan is very optimistic and says that not only can his team win anything, but that it is going to take the time prize tomorrow night. Two of the men on the team, R. B. Todd, '08, and H. W. Blackburn, '08, were members of last year's team, while the new men are C. W. Gram, '09, and G. S. Gould, '07, with A. L. Moses, '09, also of last year's team as the substitute.

Capt. K. W. Richards, '07, of the Institute team, will run in the 40-yard dash invitation, and M. E. MacGregor, '07, is entered in the invitation two-mile. Richards won his spurs last year by walking away with the 40-yard handicap in the B. A. A. games. He was kept out of other meets later in the season by a bad ankle, but did fine work on the cinder path in the various spring contests, notably the winning of first in the 100-yard dash in the Tech-Williams dual meet. He is fine form this year and is running the dashes faster than ever.

MacGregor is essentially a cross country runner, but has shown all the form of a two-miler. Last fall he achieved distinction in both the Tech-Harvard and the intercollegiate runs, winning second in the former, and finishing first of the M. I. T. runners in the latter. He has been practising hard during the past week and is in good shape. The following men will represent the Institute in the open events:
