Law his vote will go for a foreign and domestic policy based upon enlightened and well-recognized principles of International Law and international policy. It is a trite saying that we cannot understand a statute unless we understand the common law which the statute either has changed or was intended to modify. It is equally true, if not so trite, that we cannot understand the municipal law of the United States and municipal problems which confront us unless we understand International Law, which is a fundamental and constituent part of the law of the land.

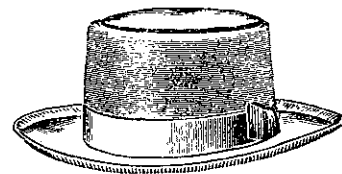
