tion this department of the Institute has become world-wide known in the field of physico-chemistry.

Prof. Noyes is perhaps best known through his scheme of qualitative analysis, better known as "A Detailed Course in Qualitative Analysis." In the instruction of chemistry this book has become a classic. Further additions have been made to it and several changes made in a recently published analysis scheme which was first printed last year in the Technology Quarterly.

His other best known books are "Laboratory Experiments on the Class Reactions and Identification of Organic Substances" and "General Principles of Physical Science." He has written numerous articles for scientific magazines and periodicals.

Prof. Noyes has always taken an active interest in the alumni association and in the school in general. In his talk to the Freshmen last year on the importance of general studies he showed his great interest in the social side of student life. He spoke of the great importance of learning to speak and write well and of the advantage of social intercourse with one's fellow students.

TECH TIES WITH HARVARD.

Fernstrom '10 Wins a Third in Jamestown Meet, Giving Tech Two Points.

By winning one third-place in the Jamestown Exposition track meet on June 22, Tech tied Harvard and George Washington University for sixth place with a total score of two points. C. F. Fernstrom, '10, won Tech's only place by taking third in the 220-yard hurdles. Princeton won the meet with a total score of 60 points. Pensy had 44, and Swarthmore, Missouri, and Texas followed in the order named.
