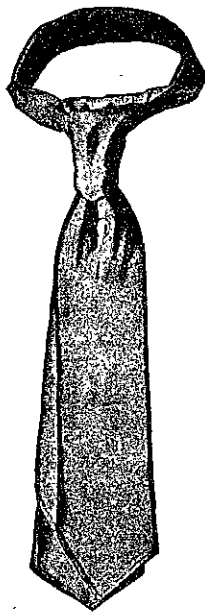


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LECTURE COURSES FOR TECH MEN.

The eighth course will be eight lectures by Morris H. Morgan, professor of Classical Philology in Harvard University, on "The Private Life of the Romans." On Wednesdays and Saturdays at 8 P. M., beginning Wednesday, Jan. 8, 1908.

The ninth course will be eight lectures by George Hodges, D.D., dean of the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, on "The Early Church." On Mondays and Thursdays, beginning Monday, Jan. 20.

The tenth course will be eight lectures by Theodore W. Richards, professor of

Chemistry in Harvard University, on "The Early History and Recent Development of the Atomic Theory." On Mondays and Thursdays at 8 P. M., beginning Monday, Feb. 17.

The eleventh course will be eight lectures by Albert Bushnell Hart, professor of History in Harvard University, on "The Real South." On Tuesdays and Fridays at 8 P. M., beginning Tuesday, Feb. 18.

The twelfth course will be eight lectures by George Walter Prothero, M. A., Litt. D., LL.D., of London, England, late president of the Royal Historical Society; editor of the Quarterly Review, and of the Cambridge Historical Series; author of the Life and Times of Simon de Montfort, Statutes and Constitutional Documents of the Reigns of Elizabeth and James I., etc., on "Napoleon III. and the Second Empire." On Mondays and Thursdays at 8 P. M., beginning Monday, March 16.

NEW LOCATION SEEMS PROBABLE.

Technology made no effort to acquire either the Old Harvard Medical School or the old Art Museum. In both cases these were buildings which could easily be adapted to needs of the Institute for schoolrooms.

The only plot of land owned by the Institute in the vicinity of the present site and not occupied by Institute buildings is that upon which Copley Hall stands. This plot faces on Clarendon street and is directly back of Engineering A. The lease on this property runs out early next year. This plot might accommodate the Walker Memorial Building, and there have been some rumors that it would be the site of the new building.

However, the assurance from the authorities that it would not be best to develop upon the present site and that a great addition is to be made seems to point to a new location for Technology. In that case, as Professor Noyes has pointed out, the Corporation may ask the Legislature to take over the present site as State lands, and allow Tech to realize their cash value. It is possible that the committee on the new site from the Corporation will report to the Corporation at the first meeting of the year early in this month.

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
