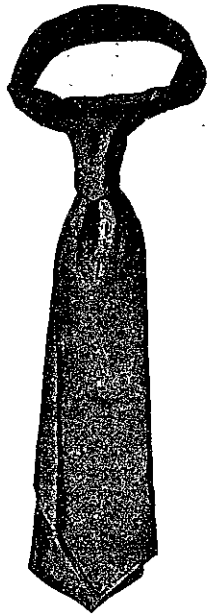

LECTURE.—A course of lectures on "The Constitution of Matter in the Light of Recent Discovery," will be given by Dr. Comstock, at 4.15 on Thursday afternoons, beginning Oct. 17, in 23 Walker. The course will be open to third year, fourth year, and graduate students as well as to members of the Instructing Staff.

It is intended to give a fairly comprehensive account of the present state of knowledge respecting the structure of matter and its connection with the closely related problem of the nature of electricity.

### ELECTRICALS MEET.

Addresses by Professors Dugald C. Jackson and Harrison W. Smith.

The Electrical Engineering Society opened its year with a large and enthusiastic meeting at the Union last Friday evening. Professor Jackson was the first speaker of the evening. He endorsed the aims of the society, and urged the men to attend its meetings and become mutually acquainted. He next spoke of the attitude the men ought to assume toward any speaker whom they might hear at any time, suggesting that they should consider him with regard to his own specialty and to how he had attained his prominence.

Professor Harrison W. Smith spoke to the men of the value of a knowledge of human nature. On a recent trip abroad he met a prominent graduate now located in London, who remarked upon the necessity of Tech men getting into society and knowing men. He closed his talk with an invitation to every student to call on him whenever he was able to do so.

During the business meeting a committee was appointed to make changes in the club shingle, and a resolution was passed to admit Juniors to membership upon their paying the dues and signing the constitution. Meetings are to be held upon the first Monday of every month until further notice.
