### HEALTH AND HEAD.

"The college that forbids honors in athletics to those who have not attained a certain grade in scholarship should make the rule work both ways and forbid honors in scholarship until the student has attained a certain grade in athletics." So says Dr. Sargent of Harvard. This statement, striking, as it does, a new note in the discussion as to the relation between work in the class room and play in the field, is doubtless a little extreme, but it goes to show that a great deal of importance should be attached to the matter of adequate and reasonable physical training.

Dr. Sargent is upheld in this opinion by some of the foremost educators of the East, and the statement cannot be disregarded, coming as it does from such a high authority. Take note of this, then, you grinds: There is something worth while outside the narrow pale of the school room. There is something that counts, that is of value, outside the covers of books. Health is of importance as well as head. Do not neglect this. Do not think that your physical condition is of minor consideration. Take careful note of this, and heed the warning now.

### CHANGE IN ASSOCIATION.

In another column of THE TECH is the account of the plan for reorganization of the Athletic Association as adopted by the committee appointed to consider the matter. The idea of the originator of the scheme and the idea of this committee has been to make the scope of the association as wide as possible and to admit to it as many as possible who are sincerely interested in Tech athletics. To this end, it has been included in the plan to be finally brought up for action, to make members of the association all managers and captains of varsity teams. Captains and managers of class teams are given a voice but not a vote. This will bring the administrative and active participants in the work closer together.

The plan as it is now presented to the student body is a most admirable one. It has been prepared by those who are best fitted to know the needs of Tech athletics. There is no doubt that it is a great improvement over the old plan and it is to be hoped that it will be finally adopted Friday at a large and well attended meeting of representative Tech men.

of such amendment or suspension be given at least one week previous to any meeting.

From the Committee:—

The Constitution and By-laws as printed are identical with former Constitution and By-Laws of the association except that:

Section 1 of Article II, reading "All students of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology shall be members of the association" has been amended to read "The membership of this association shall consist of twenty undergraduates, five elected from and by each class, and the managers and the captains of all varsity teams."

Section 3 of Article II of the Constitution has been inserted, reading "The managers and captains of all class teams shall be members of the association during term of office, but without vote."

Section 1 of Article IV of the By-Laws, reading "A quorum shall consist of twenty members" has been amended to read "A quorum shall consist of one-half the membership of the association." The other sections and articles can stand until changed by the new association.
