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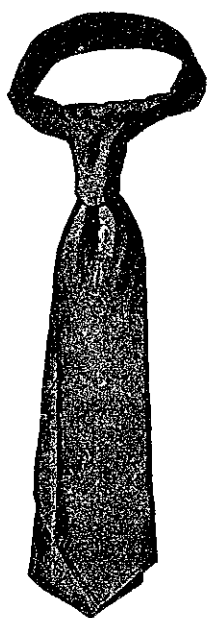
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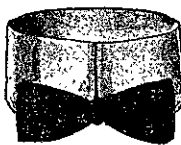

man of thoughtfulness, originality and energy are present on all sides. The rewards of successful attainment are adequate,—and there are reasons for the expectation that these will improve with the present steadily increasing development of the profession and the growing appreciation of its importance to a wide variety of industries, many of them to outward appearances essentially non-chemical in their character.

As in the case of other Institute Courses, Courses V and X have been changed from time to time to meet altered conditions. The Course in Chemical Engineering has been radically altered from a course in which a greater amount of time and greater stress was laid on engineering subjects, to one which is primarily a chemical course. The change was made as a result of a well-defined demand for men who, while they have a sound knowledge of chemical science, can also assume intelligently responsibility in matters of superintendence or construction involving the principles of engineering. The graduate of this course cannot, of course, be a full-fledged mechanical engineer, as well as a chemist, but he has a fundamental knowledge of engineering to which he can profitably add, through study and broadening experience. The present fourth-year class is the first to graduate under the new conditions.

On the chemical side of both the courses there have been changes to promote efficiency of instruction which could, however, only be made clear in a longer detailed statement. The unusual facilities for research work in chemistry which the Institute is now able to offer are specially worthy of notice if space permitted.

Each of these Courses has contributed its quota of men occupying positions of large responsibility. The graduates have taken an influential share in the development of such important New England industries as those of the manufacturing

of paper, rubber, or gas, and heavy chemicals, and in the textile industries, and also in the safeguarding of the public health through the construction and protection of systems of water supply, the disposal of sewage, and the examination of food supplies, in this and other communities. Among such former students in these courses may be mentioned the President and Treasurer, Mr. S. W. Wilder, and Vice-President and Superintendent, Mr. Henry Howard, of the Merrimac Chemical Company; the superintendent of the Cochrane Chemical Company, Mr. F. G. Stantial; the chemist of the Pacific Mills, Mr. John Alden; the director of the Research Laboratory of the General Electric Company, Dr. W. R. Whitney, and of that of the National Carbon Company, Dr. J. W. Brown; the well-known chemical engineer and expert, Mr. A. D. Little, and Messrs. Allen Hazen and George W. Fuller, Sanitary Engineers. These Courses have given to the teaching profession, among others: Professors Merrill of the University of Vermont, Kinnicutt of Worcester Polytechnic Institute, Lindsay of Dickinson College, and Dickerman of the University of Wisconsin, besides Professors Noyes, Bardwell, Gill, Thorp, Mulliken, Sherrill, Tyler, Prescott and Talbot of the Institute staff, all of whom have contributed to the advancement of chemical science.
