ers from the Brookline and Jamaica Plain districts.

These muckers broke some panels in the locker-room door and tore down a section of the fence and attacked the Tech men with sticks and stones. About 10.30 o'clock 1910 and 1911 were obliged to band together against the common enemy. Repeated attacks were to no avail, and the Tech combatants were not left to their peace until a scouting party finally called up several Brookline policemen.

A squad of 15 Sophs arrived at the Field at four o'clock and held possession of the locker-room without opposition for the arrival of the evening squad at 7.30. Nearly 35 men came in this bunch, but nothing was done until the arrival of the second squad of 20 men, at 9. Luncheon of coffee and sandwiches was served in the locker-room.

It was soon after the arrival of the last squad that the young Brookline ruffians began their operations, and attacked 30 Freshmen, who had arrived.

After the police had cleared the Field of outsiders, it required a few minutes only for the Freshmen scouts to locate the 1910 banner already suspended from the trees. Demonstrations on the part of the 1911 men were unheeded until they had begun to send men up the trees. For two hours they attacked and retreated, and for a like length of time the Freshmen were on the defensive.

The Freshmen gradually dispersed until the occupants of the tree included one 1910 man, held by three 1911 men at the top, and four Sophomores below.

Becoming discouraged at the desertion by their class mates the three Freshmen in the tree finally gave in and from this time on there was no opposition to 1910's plans.

The 1910 flag had been torn to shreds, but an hour or two before daylight the Sophomores put up a large 10 banner made of heavy canvas and strung on a half inch steel cable, riveted to the trees. The flag remained there undisturbed throughout Field Day. It was guarded by several Sophomores, Munoz '10, staying up in one of the trees from seven in the morning until four in the afternoon.

ter part of the back stretch, when Cushman 1910 gained a little.

The Freshman runner lost in the next pass and Gould 1910 was over 30 yards ahead before McAllen began to run. Gould increased his lead so that Kalbach had a splendid start.

Spencer 1911 made a good relay and pulled Kalbach's good lead, coming up to Stevens 1911 20 yards behind his competitor. However, the Sophomore pass was good and Hemmenway had over 30 yards when he swung onto the turn. Stevens cut this lead slightly.

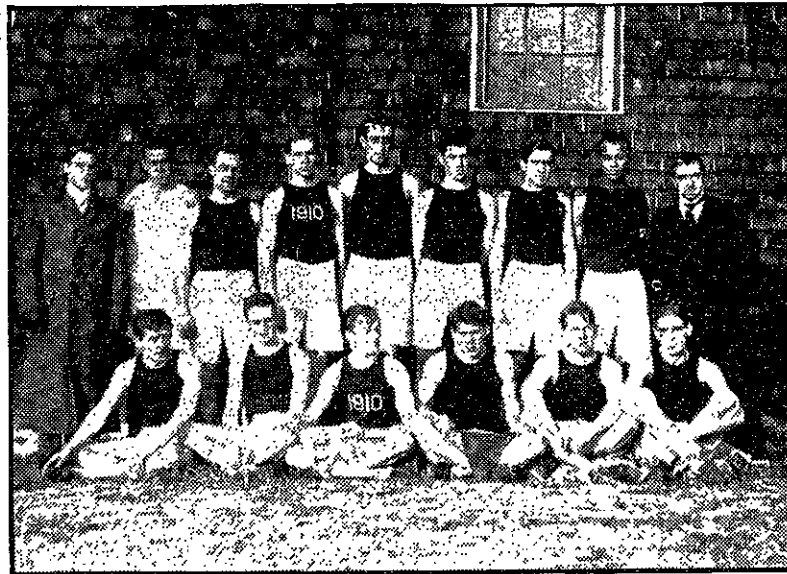
Hall then took the flag for the Sophs, starting with a clean relay. There was a mixup of Freshmen when Stevens passed to James, but the latter Freshman runner cut into Hall's lead.

In the eighth relay White for the Freshmen pulled down J. Avery's lead to 20 yards, but James got the flag to White better in any other Freshman relay.

Brown 1910 increased his lead over Prentiss 1911 in the next relay, and gave to Hart a start of 35 yards. Salisbury for the 1911 team gained on his competitor a good amount. When Cummings took up the Sophomore colors, Salisbury was less than 20 yards away.

Wilbur 1911 took his relay in good shape and went after Cummings. The experienced Sophomore runner held his own well, but toward the end lost a little, coming in 10 yards ahead.

Stewart went away from the mark quickly while Wilbur made a poor pass to Seligman. When Seligman appeared on the curve he was thirty yards in the rear.

Then came electrification, for Seligman gained rapidly on Stewart. As the runners came into the stretch Seligman was only a few yards behind Stewart and gaining. Stewart pushed across the finish line with his Freshman opponent at his back. Seligman's time for this was said to be less than 23 seconds.

The time for the race, 5 minutes, gives the average 25 seconds to each man per relay. This record was made two years ago by the 1908 team in an easy race.

1910 OVERWHELMS FRESHMEN.

The Freshman lost five yards on a fumble by the quarter. Van Tassel gained 10 yards through the center. Pray then made a splendid punt on the second down, Saul running it back 10 yards. An on-side kick was again tried, giving the ball to the Freshmen on their 51-yard line.

O'Hearn carried the ball two yards and on the next play Hurley broke through the line and would have had a clear field except for DeFloriez, who nailed him in a fine tackle. On the next play Hurley again broke away and ran thirty yards, downing the ball behind the goal posts. Saul missed an easy goal. Score, 1910 5, 1911 0. Time 11 minutes, 30 seconds.

Pray kicked off to Loutit who advanced the ball to the 30-yard line. Saul made another center play for 10 yards. By clever dodging Hurley made 10 yards in a broken field, bringing the ball to the 48-yard line. Billings then made a clever run that was good for seven yards, and Saul gained 10 yards, fumbling the ball and regaining it again. Hurley was here again pushed over for a touchdown. Saul missed a rather difficult goal. Score, 1910 10, 1911 0. Time 16 minutes, 10 seconds.

Pray made a poor kick-off to Emerson, who advanced the ball 10 yards. The Sophomores made three yards on a center play, bringing the ball to the middle of the field. An on-side kick made and regained by Billings netted 10 yards. Saul again crashed through the center for a ten yard gain. On the next play he fumbled and Williams fell on the ball for the Freshmen.

1911 was penalized for roughness and the Sophomores were given half way to the goal line. Saul tried the forward pass unsuccessfully and in consequence lost 15 yards. 1910 punted. Pray fumbled the ball, regained it, and was tackled behind the goal line before he could get under way.

As a result the Freshmen punted out from the 25-yard line to Billings, Hurley receiving the ball from him and advancing it 11 yards.

O'Hearn made a 50-yard punt and

Pray was dropped in his tracks by the ends. Pray returned the punt and Billings made a splendid catch on the 40-yard line. The Sophomores made one yard through center and on the next play nearly missed a forward pass, regaining it by a very bare margin on their opponents 13-yard line. At this point time was called. Score, 1910 10, 1911 0.

In the second half O'Hearn kicked off to 1911 but 1910 was off-side, and the ball was kicked off again five yards further back. The Freshman quarter back fumbled on the next play but the ball was recovered by DeFloriez. A play intended for a forward pass was ruled as a side pass not executed as such. A 15-yard penalty was imposed.

Pray here punted and Billings in one of the cleverest runs of the game made 20 yards through a broken field. On an unsuccessful on-side kick 1911 gained possession of the ball on the 35-yard line. Pray immediately returned the ball by a punt and Billings made a spectacular catch.

In an elaborate open formation tried by the Sophomores at this point, Bell came across as a fake and the ball was given to Emerson on a long pass to the left. The attempt failed miserably attended by a loss of five yards.

O'Hearn punted. The kick was blocked, Fitzwater recovering the ball. Billings encircled left to the side but failed to make any gain. Another punt was blocked and the ball went to the Freshman. Proctor was replaced by Hutchins, and Coupal took the place of Schatz at quarter.

1910 held the Freshmen for downs on the Sophomores' 10-yard line, but were penalized for holding, giving them the ball on the 5-yard line. Cowee went in at left half.

Saul made 10 yards, and O'Hearn made 17 more on a brilliant run around the right wing, DeFloriez missing the tackle. Saul made 5 and Hurley 1-2 yards.

An on-side kick by the Sophomores gave 1911 the ball. One yard was gained on the next play, but a penalty of five yards was declared for illegal formation. Scoville went in at right half.

Pray punted and Loutit made two yards on the next play. Hurley made one, and on an on-side kick the Freshmen gained possession of the ball. Pray kicked and Pavolid, who had gone in at end, recovered the ball. Pray punted and Billings received the ball making 30 yards around end.
