Each man will be changed frequently from one class of work to another in order that the Board of Editors may learn the field for which he is best adapted. Appointment to the News Staff in the Freshman year will lead to election to the Staff of Associate Editors in the Sophomore year when the work will become more editorial than reportorial.

From the Associate Editors will be chosen the men, who in their Junior and Senior years will compromise the Board of Editors. Throughout this competition the best man will get the vacant place, and the larger the number of men out the more time will a man have to do the highest quality of work.

The Editor of THE TECH:—

The Civic Club desires to bring to the attention of Tech men an opportunity afforded by the Good Government Association of Boston. The Boston Good Government Association was formed in 1903. Its governing body is an executive committee made up of delegates from the Boston Chamber of Commerce, the Merchants' Association, the Bar Association, the Associated Board of Trade, and the Real Estate Exchange.

The purpose of the Association is to awaken public interest in city affairs and to secure the election of honest and capable men, regardless of party. It has organized Ward Committees in every ward. Its Committee of Public Meetings supplies speakers for all sorts of occasions. It has carried on many special investigations of city departments, the most notable being the so-called "Fenway Scandal." It publishes a monthly bulletin called "City Affairs." It has done a large work in bringing out non-voters to the polls. The central piece of work, perhaps, is the publication of records of candidates for municipal office.

The Association has opened an account with every man in Boston municipal life. Each year it interviews, investigates, and writes up every candidate for municipal office. These records are mailed to every voter in the city. The work is carried on by a corps of about one hundred volunteer investigators, mostly young business and professional men and some students from the various schools about Boston. In past years a number of Tech students have aided in this work by acting as investigators. This year an appeal has been made for the help of Tech men. The undersigned members of the Civic Club will be glad to explain the nature of the service desired, and to put any one who is interested in touch with the Association. As to the general meeting of the investigators and the preliminary explanation of the work will occasion, all who are willing to lend a hand should com-
