**GEOLOGICAL TRIPS**

Those taking the trip to Winthrop Beach on Saturday afternoon, October 10, with Professor Shimer will meet on the beach directly up the street from Winthrop Beach station at about 3 P. M. To get there take trolley to Boylston St. station at about 2 P. M.; elevated to Rowe's Wharf; ferryboat and train to Winthrop Beach station. Will reach Boston on return trip at about 6 P. M., or earlier if desired. Fare, 20 cents.

Object of excursion—to collect and name shells, sea-weeds, etc., found on the beach; to note habits and general organization of the living forms found in the pools left by the retreating tide; to compare fossils in glacial deposits with shells now living. To aid in this, leaflet guides will be furnished each person.

Those wishing to make collections should bring small bags, or newspapers would do. A small hand microscope will be found very useful. All students interested are invited.
