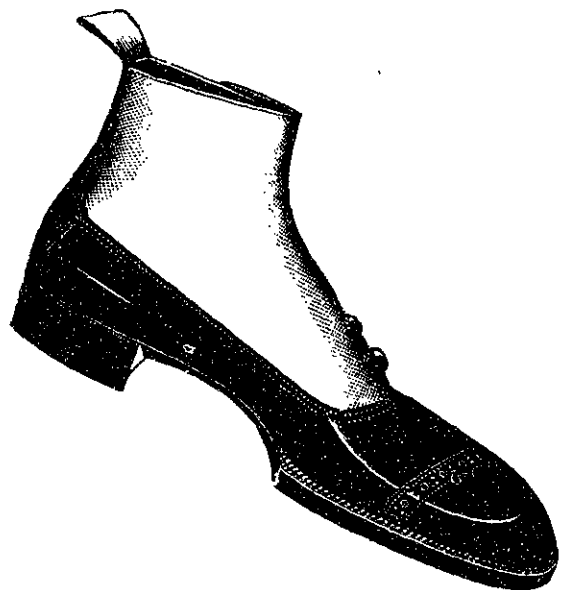

## POLICE PERMIT PARADE

Present Indications Puts Juniors  
in Lead in Procession

Enthusiasm is growing at the Insti-  
tute over the coming torchlight parade,  
Oct. 30. In every class, men are busy  
selling tickets for uniforms and torches.  
So far all indications would show that  
the Juniors will have by far the largest  
representation in the parade.

Four years ago seven hundred men  
marched in the parade for Technology  
and this year more still are expected to  
be ready to carry torches on Halloween  
night. If things turn out according to  
indications the Tech delegation will  
slightly outnumber that from Harvard.

Owing to the trouble with the police  
four years ago, it was only with diffi-  
culty that the police commissioners  
could be induced to issue a permit for  
the intercollegiate parade. They finally,  
however, issued a permit allowing a  
parade of members of the Republican  
Clubs of the New England colleges. At  
least three thousand college men are  
expected to march.

The men will march in columns of  
four, with a line of men on either side  
of the column carrying colored fire  
torches. Five hundred men will con-  
stitute a division and will be led by  
a division marshal appointed by the  
National League, and five assistant  
marshals appointed by him. Bands will  
march at the head and behind each  
division and the parade ought to be the  
biggest and most dazzling one that has  
ever graced Boston.
