A decided disinclination to support athletics at the Institute has been met by the men who are trying to sell tickets for the fall games. Attendance at the various track meets held at the Field and an occasional subscription are the only calls made directly on the student body to support this very essential branch of undergraduate activity. Most colleges require a fee for athletics from every student. Technology relies on the loyalty of the men here to keep these things going.

Men who are willing to give their time and energy to maintaining or enhancing the athletic prestige of the Institute should at least be encouraged by the attendance of their busier or less ambitious fellow students. The cost of seeing this meet is only 25 cents, yet a large attendance is a very considerable aid to the athletic association and they certainly need the money.

Several important matters depend on the fall handicap meet. In the first place it gives an indication of the possible material for next year's track team among the new men. It will also give the cross-country men some practise in team running. But of perhaps greater importance is the fact that the attendance at the meet will show the attitude of the students toward athletics.

Therefore if you are not approached by a man with some tickets or can not find one bring a quarter to the Field Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. In any case be there.

No reliability can be put in the exchange board in Rogers because those who use the board do not take the trouble to remove their antiquated notices.
