LECTURE ON COLLOIDS

Given Before Leather Chemists
 by Institute Instructors

An illustrated lecture on colloids was given by Dr. Spear and Mr. Field, Friday afternoon, before the Leather Chemists Association in Room 24 Walker, on the occasion of their fourth annual meeting. The subject is one of considerable importance in the industries of dyeing, tanning, glass-making, brewing, and photography; but up to the present, although a great amount of work has been done, no one theory that has been advanced is comprehensive enough to explain all the experimental facts. The salient points of the subject were illustrated by experiments which President A. A. Noyes used in his lecture on colloids before the American Chemical Society at their winter meeting in December, 1904. After the lecture the meeting adjourned to the Brunswick Hotel, there to conclude their business meeting which opened Thursday morning.

FRESHMEN TO DINE

THOMPSON TO SPEAK

On Applied Electro-Chemistry
 at Meeting Tomorrow

A very interesting program has been arranged for the next meeting of the Electrical Engineering Society to be held in the Union tomorrow evening at 7:30.

The speaker for the evening was to have been Mr. James Corning of the Boston Elevated Railway, but he will be unable to be present. In his place President John Mills has arranged to have Professor M. DeK. Thompson, of the Physics department address the society on the subject of "Applied Electro-Chemistry." Professor Thompson's talk will be accompanied by numerous stereoptican slides. He will discuss in detail the separation of the metal from the ore by electro-chemical means and the subsequent reduction in the electric furnace. A full attendance is desired.

President Mills also urges that the members of the society attend a lecture held under the auspices of the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Boston, Wednesday evening, Nov. 18. The speaker for the evening will be Mr. L. L. Elden, who will speak on "Potential Underground Transmission." The lecture is to be held in the Auditorium of the company, 39 Boylston street.
