SECOND TEAM WINS

Fences and windows along the route were occupied by people off for the holiday. Their remarks were intended to cheer the runners and besides accomplishing this end furnished considerable amusement. The road was quite muddy, but the drizzle kept the men fresh. A large crowd was gathered at the finish line and cheered wildly as the leaders hove in sight.

W. S. Grassie of Boston was the first to appear and after a desperate struggle, won by five seconds from Joe Ballard, who was so completely exhausted by his attempt to catch the winner that he had to be carried to the dressing rooms. Grassie's time for the 10 miles was 57 minutes 28 seconds, which is 4 minutes and 3 seconds slower than the record for the course, held by Coach Frank M. Kanaly. Roy Welton was third, in 57 minutes 45 seconds. Stephenson and MacCreadie jogged in tenth and eleventh, 61 minutes 11 seconds, and 61 minutes 58 seconds, respectively. Benson and Ballard finished next for Tech in 15th and 16th positions, with the times 64 minutes 23 seconds and 64 minutes 37 seconds, to their credit. Jenks was 25th in 67 minutes 38 seconds. All of the Technology men finished in fine form. The second team scored 77 points, which is 30 points better than their nearest competitor, the Brookline Gymnasium Athletic Association.

The team trophy, which is a regular A. A. U. shield, is now being engraved and will soon be placed at the disposal of the Union house committee.
