Wins Fencing Meet by Brilliant Defensive and Offensive Work

Amid the applause of several hundred, Technology won the fencing meet with the Boston Y. M. C. A., last Saturday, by eight bouts to one. The match that was lost was really a draw, but was awarded to the Y. M. C. A. man because of his better form.

Ensign H. G. Knox, U. S. N., 1911, did magnificent work and he has a great chance for the intercollegiate fencing championship. His defensive work was brilliant and his opponent seldom had a chance to outfence him. While his offensive work was not as good as his defense, nevertheless, he was quick to pick openings in his opponent's defense.

E. M. Loring 1909, last year's captain, was brilliant in his offensive work. He fairly took his opponent off his feet and kept him continually on the defence.

Capt. V. C. Grubnau 1909, while not so brilliant as his two team-mates, did excellent work, and he can be counted upon every time to give his opponent the hardest kind of a match.

Of the Y. M. C. A. team, L. Barroll, Harvard 1909, did the best work. His fencing was the exact duplicate of Loring's. He was very good offensively, but weak on the defence. The other members of the Y. M. C. A. team were Capt. W. C. Bowers, Harvard 1910, and Dr. C. E. Brewer of Leyden University, Germany.

Perhaps the greatest problem to be solved would be that of financial backing. At first, the experienced players will be relied upon as coaches, and although the ultimate success of the team is dependent upon these stars, there will be plenty of room for material less experienced. As soon as the approval of the Athletic Association can be obtained, a subscription list will be started which is headed by a gift of \$25 from an instructor in the chemical department. After that it will be up to the student body to support the team financially.
