STATISTICS PREPARED

To be Repeated Every 5 Years
Data Held in Confidence

Following close upon the request from the United States Immigration Commission for scholastic information, a partial census of the entire student body of the Institute will be made some day this month. This compilation of statistics is being carried out by the Bureau of Education at Washington, and is to be repeated in future at intervals of five years.

The data collected will be classified under four heads. Under the first head will be tabulated the number of students, male and female, with their ages, in each of the undergraduate and graduate classes.

Class II will comprise a record of the economic status of 25 students chosen from the freshman class, alphabetically, according to the occupation of the father.

The percentage will be figured of those whose fathers are professional men, including editors and architects; farmers operating a farm worth \$5000 or over; who make an annual income of \$2000 or over in manufacturing, trade, office work, etc.; or who are skilled laborers earning over \$750, etc.

Class III will record from the same twenty-five students the number of hours per week spent by each in gainful employment together with their aggregate earnings for the past year.

This data required is of a somewhat personal nature, but it is hoped that the facts will be willingly forthcoming. All data is held in strict confidence by the Registrar, and is immediately turned over to the officials at Washington.

The scheme for gathering this information is now being worked out by the Registrar's office and at an early date the instructors of the Institute will be asked to tabulate a part of the above census.
