SECOND TEAM LOSES

Saturday night the second basketball team was overwhelmingly defeated by the Bridgewater Normal School five. The defeat was largely due to the fact that the game was played under inter-scholastic instead of inter-collegiate rules, to which the men were accustomed.

In the first half Bridgewater ran away from the Institute team. The Tech team played loosely and when they did get hold of the ball did not know what to do with it. Bridgewater displayed remarkable shooting power and worked the short pass game to perfection. The half ended with the score 48 to 6 in favor of Bridgewater.

The second half was played under inter-collegiate rules and the Tech team outplayed their opponents. They did not do it on form or team work, however, but by individual playing and legal roughness.

The final score was 62 to 18. Lincoln and Wheeler excelled for Bridgewater and Stone and Tait did the most consistent work for Tech. Schatz played well for Tech in the second half.

The second team's next game will be played Thursday night against the Tufts second string squad, where the team should put up a much better game as the other contest will take place under inter-collegiate rules.

INSTITUTE COMMITTEE

Decision Made in Regard to Uniformity of Bulletin Boards

At the meeting of the Institute Committee, Monday afternoon, H. M. Davis 1911, was elected to serve on the Union Committee in place of A. W. Yearance 1911, who has resigned.

The bulletin board committee reported that the bulletin boards for the Institute buildings have been completed and are now ready to be put up. A discussion followed as to the advisability of securing rubber stamps to be loaned for the purpose of making all posters uniform. It was finally decided to procure such a set for the benefit of those persons who desire to use them, with the further stipulation that all objectionable appearing posters are to be removed without notice.

It was moved that the secretary of the Institute Committee be instructed to write to the secretaries of the various other Institute organizations, asking them not to hold their meetings or dinners on Friday evenings, as it is desired to keep these clear for the Union entertainments.

The secretary was further instructed to ask the two classes who have not yet done so to make provision at their next class meeting for recognizing the Institute Committee as a student governing body in-so-far as this does not conflict with the class constitutions.
