The bulletin boards have at last arrived. They will be of little worth, however, if the rulings of the committee as to their use are not followed.

Tech is one of the leading institutions of the country in minor sports, as well as in regular track and field events, says the New York Sun. In cross-country running, hockey and basketball M. I. T. is as good as the best. Beating Harvard, Dartmouth and Williams is a good record for the basketball men thus far this season.

This year the officers of the cadet battalion have undertaken to continue the old practise of giving an annual military ball. It has been three years since the last one, which was a most successful affair. The preparations for next Friday's dance are developing along lines that promise to equal those of the last.

Those who have been to a military ball need no urging, and those who have never been to one will have an opportunity to find out what they are like.

Technology has this year the fastest quartet at the one mile relay that ever wore the cardinal and gray. At the B. A. A. meet they did 1560 yards in 3 minutes, 10 seconds, the fastest time made. The relay will run in the intercollegiate mile tomorrow night in New York. This will be the first race of the Institute with Harvard at less than four miles.

A lot of loyal Tech men will be at the Back Bay station today at 2.45 P. M. to cheer the team and coach as they leave. Will you be there?

It seems that it is again necessary to call the attention of the various student organizations to the fact that as far as possible social or athletic events should not be scheduled for Friday evenings, as by so doing the regular Union entertainments are interfered with. Two institute activities have carried out arrangements for Friday evening dances this month, thereby drawing to these events a certain number of fellows who would otherwise attend the interesting talks promised by Mr. Fagan and Rabbi Fleischer.

Two years ago the Kommers in the old Union were given up because of insufficient support. In this way a most excellent custom died.

That the Friday evening entertainments may not follow the way of the old Kommers it should be the endeavor of every undergraduate to keep the ball rolling. The other activities can help out by holding their celebrities on other than Friday nights.

The Institute Committee's sub-committee on bulletin boards is trying to systematize and make as attractive as possible the posting of notices in the various Technology buildings, and asks the co-operation of the activities using the newly placed bill boards in keeping them as neat as possible. It is the plan of the committee to have some fastening device placed on the boards, so that posters may be properly held on without the use of tacks. It was the intention of the committee to have all posters of a size uniform with the rectangles marked off on the boards, but as many of the activities have a considerable supply of printed posters of different size on hand, it is felt that the immediate enforcement of this rule would be somewhat unjust. This rule will be strictly enforced at the beginning of the next school year, so any societies contemplating having posters printed will do well to have them made standard size. For the present each poster must be fastened to the board by a tack in each corner. The committee does not feel that it is asking too much in requiring this, and warning is hereby given that beginning February 15, 1909, any advertisement posted in violation of this rule will be removed without notice.
