James P. Munroe, secretary of the corporation, was the principal speaker at a Lincoln meeting of the Boston Y. M. C. A. last Sunday evening.

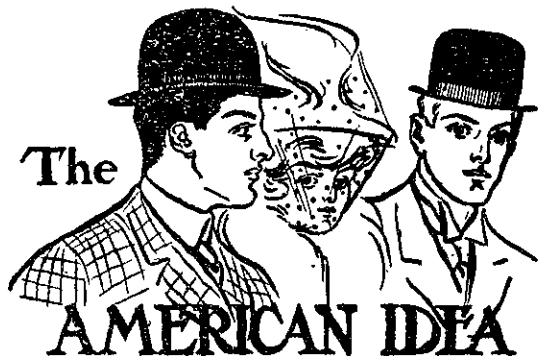
