

DR. LUCKE WILL SPEAK

To Address Society of Arts on
"Gas Power"—all Invited

On Saturday evening at eight o'clock in Huntington Hall Dr. Lucke will lecture on "Gas Power." He is at the head of the mechanical engineering department of Columbia University and is conceded to be one of the highest authorities on the subject. He has directed several investigations along this line and has studied all the data of tests in France and Germany and a wide range of tests on American engines.

Dr. Lucke will cover all points of importance which would naturally arise in the discussion of the subject, but while covering the field in a comprehensive way will attempt to make his address as non-technical as possible.

This is one of the regular lectures of the Society of Arts course and as usual a number of seats will be reserved for members who write for tickets. The unoccupied seats will be thrown open to the public promptly at 7.55 o'clock.
