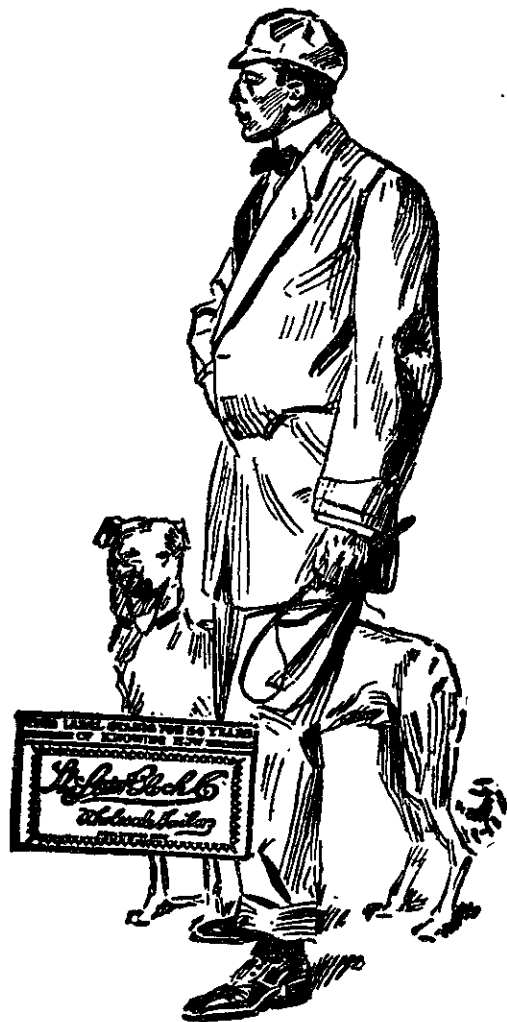

Friday night the fencing team qualified for the Intercollegiate finals by winning seven of their fifteen bouts. H. G. Knox 1910, did the best work, losing only one bout. G. Bradford of Annapolis was the man who proved to be Knox's victor. E. M. Loring 1909, won only two matches, and V. C. Grubnau 1909, proved a great disappointment by getting away with only one bout. The other teams which qualified were West Point, Yale, and Annapolis. Pennsylvania and Cornell were utterly out-classed, the fencers from Philadelphia winning only one bout. Cornell managed to win five. The team representing Technology was composed of Capt. V. C. Grubnau 1909, E. M. Loring 1909, and H. G. Knox, 1910.

Grubnau:—Won from Smith, Yale; lost to Wendell, Penn; Fassett, Cornell; Sears, West Point; and Brandt, Annapolis.

Loring:—Won from McClintock, Penn; Allison, Cornell; lost to Sanders, Yale; Cocroft, West Point; and Borchardt, Annapolis.

Knox:—Won from Espindola, Cornell; Leymel, Penn; Ross, Yale; Sohlberg, West Point; lost to Bradford, Annapolis.
