SUBMARINE LECTURE

The United States submarine Octopus, with her submerged speed of 10 knots and surface speed of 11 knots, compares favorably with the boats of this type now in use by any nation on the face of the globe," said Mason S. Chace of the Ecole d'Application du Genie Maritime, Paris, yesterday afternoon to the members of the naval architectural department.

Contrary to the opinion generally expressed, the speaker declared that France had gone backward in this respect during the last few years, and is now outstripped in the building of submarines of a high type by England, Italy, and the United States. As far as efficiency is concerned, the British craft are the best, as they have attained a speed of 16 knots on the surface, and 10 under water. Italy has a type of submarines that has reached a speed of 15 knots on the surface, but they can only go to 8 submerged.

"To attain high speed, and thus compete with the battleship on the high seas," said the speaker, "two things must be done. The displacement must be increased, and the engines must be made lighter. When these improvements are made, and not before, will the submarine serve the purpose for which it primarily is intended."
