Institute Gym Team

The program consisted of nine events. One of the features was a German cavalry dual between Tucker and Inger, both of the Y. M. C. A. The bout was interesting to watch and was declared a draw.

The work of the Y. M. C. A. team on the various pieces of apparatus was exceptionally good. Benzie and Brown easily excelling all the other men on the floor. Benzie is the best all-round gymnast in New England, having won more first places than any other man in gymnastic work. He has been a member of the Y. M. C.
